A CREDIT TO THE COAST.

THE encomiums which J. R. Smith of North Bend passed on the progress of San Francisco after his recent trip to that city suggests the modern miracle which has taken place there. It is four years ago since San Francisco was laid stunned and bleeding on her seven hills, like Rome after the Barbarian Invasion. The Pacific Coast united with the rest of the world in extending the hand of Christian charity to the stricken city. It was a misfortune which touched the heart of every community.

At that time there were those who predicted that the city at the Golden Gate never could realize her former glory after such a crushing blow. So appalling was the extent of the disaster, so complete the havoc wrought, that it seemed a calamity which must take the heart out of the bravest of men.

Four years is a short while, indeed, when one is dealing with history. Yet in that time a volume of history has been written by San Francisco, and a glorious work it is. In that length of time the city has not only recovered entirely from the damage done, but it has rebuilt upon bigger, better and more expensive lines than before. The traces of the fire are eliminated from the map of San Francisco today; it is the newest, most modern and one of the richest cities in the world, as well as the most sanitary. The population is greater than before the disaster of 1906. That is what the fire did for San Francisco.

"Serene, indifferent to fate,
Thou sittest at the Western Gate."
So wrote Bret Harte years ago, when San Francisco was still a mining camp. The old spirit is there, just the same, under the modern conditions. In the rush of rebuilding the San Franciscans have forgotten all about what happened four years ago; their faces are to the future, not the past.

This is a matter of pride, not only to California, but to the entire Coast. It is a typification of the spirit of the Pacific slope. It shows to the world what the people out here are—it gives the stamp to the Pacific Coast quality of manhood. The pioneer who built California was a cousin to him who built the Northwest.

Coos Bay held out the hand of relief and sympathy to San Francisco four years ago, and her heart went with it. Today she extends the hand of congratulation, and her heart is in that, too.

MOTHER'S DAY
IN NORTH BEND

Beautiful and Impressive Services Mark Occasion Devoted to Mothers.

MOTHERS DAY

A beautiful and impressive service was held at the First M. E. church of North Bend last Sunday morning in honor of Mother's Day. The church being profusely and beautifully decorated for the occasion. Promptly at 11 o'clock the Summer orchestra rendered an artistic overture, "Bridal Rose" by C. Lavalle, which was followed by the singing of hymn No. 21. After the invocation by Rev. Pierson the orchestra gave "Forest Whispers," (Morceau) by F. H. Losey. The Scripture lesson was then read following which the orchestra played the beautiful intermezzo, "Cupid's Garden," by Max C. Eugene. Rev. R. H. Pierson then delivered a scholarly and instructive sermon, subject: "The place of 'Mother' in the history of the world." He said: "The lives and achievements of the great men of the world, both ancient and modern, are largely effected by their mother's influence. No higher tribute from God can be given to woman than that she was the last of God's creative powers. Woman is therefore the crowning glory of the Divine Master's creation." He gave examples of Biblical women of great faith, devotion, susceptibility, courage and hospitality. "Among the noble mothers of the earth, who stamped their character and convictions on the lives of the great men, who had more or less to do with the great reforms of modern times, we may mention in particular the name of Susanah Wesley, mother of John and Charles Wesley, the founders of Methodism. She may rightfully be called the mother of Methodism. Great literary men and men of great genius, have classed John Wesley as one of the world's brightest intellects, which only adds lustre to this, one of the noblest of women and mothers. No higher tribute can be given woman by man than the hand that rocks the cradle is the hand that rules the world."

After singing hymn No. 364 the benediction was pronounced and the orchestra gave "Silver Threads Among the Gold" (paraphrase) by H. P. Danks, as their finale.

Evening Services.

The largest congregation ever assembled in the church filled it to overflowing Sunday evening. After singing hymn No. 57 and the invocation by Rev. R. H. Pierson, the choir sang an appropriate anthem. Following this the Scripture lesson was read, the offertory was received and Mr. Westwood was introduced as the first speaker. His address was very tender and touching and filled with many references to his own early life. He illustrated the wonderful mother-love and showed it to be never failing. After a pleasing selection by the male quartette, Dr. Brownlee announced his subject: "Can a woman forget her child?" He proved by careful reasoning that the love of the mother is next to that of God. His address showed much careful preparation. Mrs. J. W. Gardiner then sang a beautiful solo, "Oh God! Be Merciful to Me!" Major Kinney then gave an extemporaneous address through which he pleaded for higher and more altruistic ideals. For more charity and brotherly love among men in place of selfishness and envy. He appealed to the mothers of Coos Bay as the usual factors in determining the future of this country. "The Mothers," he said, have failed to train their children properly and by gossiping and slandering the characters of those who have been striving to advance the good of the community have retarded the best interests of the Bay. To a person of culture and fine sensibilities coming from the east, this country with its present state of society must indeed appear rough. The mothers can help or hinder the moral and intellectual progress of the Bay. Good, progressive men are slandered and abused instead of helped by people who are injuring their own best interests in so doing." The Major uttered some very frank remarks that may have appeared harsh but which are nevertheless only too true. Following this address the doxology was sung and the service closed with the benediction.
