Old Friend Dead.—Dr. Geo. E. Dix has received word of the death of Dr. H. T. Ricketts, a former friend of his. Dr. Ricketts was connected with the University of Chicago and had devoted his time for the last several years to investigation of spotted and typhus fevers and had won a leading place as a scientist although only thirty-nine years old. He died in the City of Mexico of typhus fever, the germ of which he was endeavoring to ascertain. He had just been appointed to a chair in the University of Pennsylvania. He spent three summers at Missoula, Mont., when Dr. Dix was stationed there, studying the spotted fever which is quite prevalent in Montana.

BOAT SPEED IS REGULATED

Port Commission Adopts Ordinance Regulating Movement of Crafts.

At a meeting of the Port of Coos Bay yesterday, a speed ordinance regulating the movement of vessels in the harbor was adopted. The ordinance will become effective June 10 and will practically restrict the speed of vessels in the upper bay to six miles an hour. It provides that vessels of sixty tons or over shall not run at a greater speed than six miles an hour between North Bend Point and the C. A. Smith mill. Crafts of less than sixty tons are not permitted to exceed six miles per hour when passing any wharf where a boat is anchored. Special provision is made for licensing speed boats running at a greater speed.

A communication from the North Bend Chamber of Commerce asking that immediate steps be taken to clear the channel near there was read. In the communication it was stated that there was only about nine feet of water on some of the shoals. Sec. Songstacken was instructed to reply that just as soon as the litigation which is hampering the commission is settled, attention would be given these shoals. It was stated that with these suits out of the way, the commission could go ahead and care for such matters. The commission with the tax money received will be able to clean up all outstanding bills.

Brings Hay Cargo—The Steamer Plant made a special landing with a cargo of hay for A. T. Haines, at the Alliance dock this afternoon. This is probably the first time that this steamer has made a special landing for a single shipment to one concern.

Mong in Moving Pictures—Wm. V. Mong, an actor well known on Coos Bay will appear in moving pictures at the Royal tonight, one of the big syndicates having made a picture of his drama "The Clay Baker," which he has produced a number of times in Marshfield.

North Bend Charter.
