"THEY SAY."

WHEN A man or woman wants to cast reflections upon the integrity of some other man or woman he or she begins her attack with the insidious phrase, "they say." This phrase is nothing more nor less than a sort of verbal hedge from behind which the assassin of character seeks to ambush his victim. It should never be used in conversation and those who do use it when speaking of the personal character of another deserves to be looked upon with suspicion.

To repeat a statement which defames one's character is criminal in the moral sense and should be in the legal sense. As it is, the person defamed is left without recourse in a legal way, the notoriety that would attach to them being more to be dreaded than the satisfaction that might result in suit for slander. This very fact has no doubt often encouraged this mean form of gossip to which both men and women are altogether too much addicted.

If all gossip were left out of the conversation of some people there would be very little savor left. Such gossip, however, that effects the character of our neighbors is unpardonable, and the wonder is that self-respecting men and women can think so lightly of it. There is nothing that people prize so highly as their own reputation for honesty, whether of intention or deed, and it seems monstrous that character assassins should be permitted to carelessly tear down character structures that has taken men and women all the years they have lived to build up.

The old fashioned virtue of reticence about one's own affairs and respect for those of others is not as rare as one may think, who is so often appalled by present day gossip, and there are thousands of mothers teaching their sons and daughters the simple code of honor that it is better to fly from their neighbor's pocket than to steal away their reputation.

In families whose intellectual standards are low, with grey matter not in excess, small talk about persons in the narrow circle of their acquaintances is all that is interesting. Sad to say, there are clubs of supposedly intellectual men and women where the gossip habit obtains, too, once in a while, but only through the talk of the thoughtless ones, and upon their fellow members rests the duty of smothering all such base tendencies. Half the mistakes of the world might be traced to such centers of gossip from which broad minded men and women should stand apart.
