KING EDWARD'S FUNERAL IS MOST IMPRESSIVE EVENT TODAY

One of Greatest Demonstrations That England Has Ever Known.

ENTIRE NATION OBSERVES DAY

Hundreds of Thousands Participate in Services for Departed Ruler.

LONDON, May 20.—The body of King Edward VII was carried through the streets of the capital today in the presence of many hundreds of thousands of subjects and with the King's of nine European nations, several future rulers, members of all the royal families of Europe and the former president of the United States following the casket from Westminster Hall to Paddington station.

Pomp and Splendor. The state funeral was conducted according to precedent, the pomp and ceremony from the past being rendered more effective by the lavish display of modern mourning.

Behind the casket on which rested the imperial symbols, followed the late king's charge while his favorite terrier was led by a highland soldier just before the imperial ensign.

No personage in the parade attracted greater attention than Theodore Roosevelt, the special American ambassador, whose civilian clothes contrasted curiously with the gilded state coach with its white wiggled and silk stockinged flunkies within which he rode.

HOLIDAY IN ENGLAND.

Sunday Quiet Prevails in Kingdom During Funeral.

LONDON, May 20.—Throughout the British empire the day was observed as one of mourning. Business generally was suspended and informal services were held. Throughout England, Sunday quiet prevailed.

SERVICES AT WINSOR.

Impressive Ceremonies Mark Funeral At Castle.

WINSOR, May 20.—When the castle gates at Winsor opened today to receive the casket of the seventh Edward, the green of an English spring was on the trees and the grass within the massive walls.

MANY HURT IN GREAT THROG

Greatest Crowd in London That English Capital Has Ever Seen.

LONDON, May 20.—The morning was clear and hot and the sun beat on the great mass of humanity that lined the route of the King's funeral procession.

Many persons suffered broken limbs and other injuries in the crush and hundreds of persons fainted, especially among the women who had been standing for hours waiting for the procession.

Arriving at Paddington station, the casket was placed on a funeral car which carried the funeral party to Winsor.

The Royal saloon was upholstered in purple and white silk and a catafalque erected in the center supported the casket. The car was occupied by King George, Queen Mary, the queen's mother Alexandra, and eight other sovereigns and near relatives.

The service of the Church of England was followed throughout. The Archbishop of Canterbury pronounced the solemn benediction after which the Bishop of Winchester knelt before the altar in silent prayer.

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HOLD SERVICES IN AMERICA.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—Officials of this city, state and government, together with the consular representatives of all nations which maintain representatives in Portland and hundreds of British born and people of other countries attend services at Trinity church here today as a tribute to the late King Edward VII.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—President Taft and members of his cabinet, justices of the supreme court, the entire diplomatic corps, and practically all of official Washington attended services here today in memory of King Edward VII at St. John's Episcopal church.

VESSEL LOST OFF NEWPORT

J. Marhoffer, Formerly Running to Coos Bay, Lost With One Life.

NEWPORT, Ore., May 20.—News was brought here today by the Chief Engineer that the gasoline steamer J. Marhoffer, San Francisco to Portland, was burned at sea twenty miles north of Yaquina Bay Wednesday night.

The J. Marhoffer has at times made trips into Coos Bay, plying in the lumber trade out of here. She has not been in here for some weeks.

COMET'S TAIL PASSES WESTWARD

Earth Will Not Be Switched by Rear Appendage of Celestial Wanderer, According to Scientists.

CARNEGIE OBSERVATORY, Mt. Wilson, Calif., May 20.—Virtually all of the tail of Halley's comet has passed into the evening sky. What little remained this morning above the eastern horizon will have disappeared in the next 24 hours.

the world need not depend on prognostication hereafter to determine whether the earth has passed the tail. They say by observation of the following rules, the status of the visitor may be known.

If just after sunset this evening the tail of the comet points towards the sun the earth has not yet passed through the tail. If the tail points away from the sun, the earth will have passed through the tail during day light hours.

If the tail points toward and away from the sun at the same time, it will mean the earth is about to enter it and will pass through it during the night.

These rules will hold good on any evening until all doubt as to the passage of the comet has been dispelled.

TAIL WAS STRAIGHT LINE.

Prof. Campbell Explains Why Comet Missed the Earth.

SAN JOSE, May 19.—Director Campbell of Lick Observatory today explained that the failure of the earth to brush the comet's tail was due to the fact that the tail lagged behind in a straight line drawn from the sun through the head of the comet.
