## PRIMARY LAW BRINGS PEACE

### Republican Factional Fights Stopped By Inauguration of Primary.

TO THE EDITOR: The advocates of the assembly say the primary is responsible for the election of Democrats. Is that statement or any part of it true?

Have they not been engaged exclusively in looking after their own selfish interests and in avenging their petty malice, real or imaginary, instead of standing by the party?

Have they not been a house divided against itself? Is it any wonder then that Democrats are elected? Is it not a fact that since the adoption of the primary, these perennial rows have ceased in a great measure? Is it not true that the cessation of hostilities is due to the primaries? If so, then why should we accept an invitation to return to the Kilkenny festivities by the adoption of the assembly?

Compared by the past, are the assembly prospects alluring? Do they appeal to one's better judgment?

The question is, shall the assembly, under the domination of a handful of politicians make the nominations for public office or shall the people make the nominations at the polls under the direct primary law? That is the question. Where do you stand? GEO. WATKINS.
