that the water company would have to furnish sufficient water on the hill to flush it. They claimed that they often go for hours without being able to get water from the faucets in their homes. The council promised to take the matter up with the water company.

Other Business.

The Coos Bay Paving and Construction Company was ordered paid about \$300 on its various city contracts.

The company was given an extension of twenty days on its North Second street work. Manager Whitmore said the company had been having trouble with its help and did not have sufficient men now to put down the bitumen, their workmen deserting to go on the Chandler building.

C. H. Walter entered a protest against John Merchant fencing off Fourth street south of Elrod avenue. Mr. Merchant claims the street was never dedicated, but others contend otherwise. City Attorney Goss was instructed to take the necessary steps to open the street.

Mr. Buck entered a protest against a further cut on Tenth street, claiming they had put the street to grade five years ago and that to cut it down now would destroy their sidewalks and damage their property. The council decided to try and change the grade to eliminate damage to the property owners.

Flanagan avenue property owners, who had protested against the grading of that street, were shown that they were laboring under a misapprehension. City Engineer Sandberg explained that only a few inches of dirt would be removed from the present top of the street to enable the plank paving to be laid to grade.

An ordinance authorizing the sale of about \$5,500 worth of improvement bonds was passed.

Chairman Powers of the street committee was instructed to have Street Commissioner McCulloch hire a gang of men and rush the South Marshfield marsh drainage ditch to completion.

Councilman Nelson was instructed to have the chimneys on the City Hall repaired. Mr. Nelson intimated that he did not intend to serve another term and consequently would not need them personally, but Councilmen Powers and Coke told him he would have to serve.

"Toots" Noble was ordered paid \$297 on his bill for building the Commercial avenue wharf. He was also allowed a claim for extra work on it.

City Recorder Butler was authorized to buy a combined typewriter and adding machine for \$267.50.

A number of current expense bills were ordered paid.

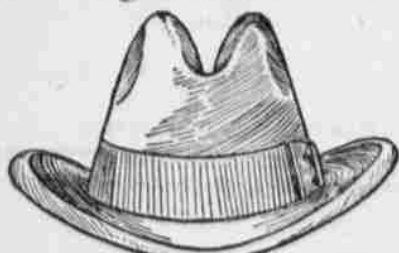
