Latter May Have Been Murdered—Russian Suspect Under Arrest.

(By Associated Press.) COMO, Italy, June 11.—The police are trying to solve the mysterious murder of an American woman, believed to be Mrs. Porter Charlton of New York, formerly Mary Crittenden Scott of San Francisco, whose body was found in a trunk in the bottom of Lake Como yesterday.

NO TRACE OF BODY FOUND

Lad Drowned Evidently Going Under Assumed Name — Word From San Jose.

As yet no trace has been found of the body of Sigbert Martin, the San Jose lad who was drowned in the Bay yesterday afternoon. Marshal Carter has had a force of men dragging the Bay near where Martin went down, but their efforts have been in vain.

A touch of pathos was added to the tragedy this morning when Marshal Carter received an answer to the telegram he sent last evening to San Jose to the address given in a note book found among Martin's effects. The answer indicates that Martin was travelling under an assumed name.
