DRY AT COQUILLE.

Use of Water There Has to Be Restricted.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "Coquille has been on the verge of going dry several times during the past week. Not that a prohibition was made against the water supply for irrigation purposes has already caused one of the reservoirs to go dry and the supply in the others was rapidly diminishing when the water superintendent called the attention of the council to the fact that the city was about to become a veritable Sahara. That august body then sat up and took notice. Thoughts of sending children to bed after the cat had been put out of doors and the clock wound, without the usual mouthful of aquapura, was more than even a councilman could stand, and the attention of the water superintendent was called to a certain ordinance which empowered him to limit the use of water for irrigation purposes to certain hours of the day and he was instructed to make use of that power at once. To add to the problem, one of the mains became unjointed and there was a gigantic spilling until the water could be shut off. However, with the bursted main repaired and the ordinance properly complied with, it is to be hoped that there will be an ample supply in the reservoirs from now on for such an emergency as a fire, and that there will be no excuse for anyone not remaining on the water wagon if they desire to."
