MORE MISREPRESENTATION.

A GOOD CAUSE does not require or rely on misrepresentation and misleading statements to sustain it. These have been the chief characteristics of the Assembly Plan from its inception. The Portland Oregonian, the principal organ of the ringsters, is the chief offender and all its little echoes, down to the snivelling Sentinel of Coquille, are quick to take the cue and follow in its false and futile footsteps toward evasion of the primary law.

The Oregonian on every possible occasion has been speaking slightly and slurring of the Prohibitionists, but it was very prompt to use their recent State convention as an example that "proves the universality of the convention instinct among citizens who seek righteousness."

It then attempts to justify the Republican Assembly on the same basis of action and as being prompted by the same motives.

The editor of the Oregonian is too familiar with the Oregon primary nominating law to plead ignorance of the following provision:

"A political party within the meaning of this act is an affiliation of electors, representing a political party or organization, which at the next general election preceding, polled for its candidate for Representative in Congress at least 25 per cent of the en-

tire vote cast for that office in the State."

The editor of the Oregonian is also too familiar with the votes polled by the various political parties in Oregon not to know that this provision bars the prohibitionists from the advantages of the law and compels them and all minor political parties to hold conventions to name their candidates. It is one of the weaknesses of the law.

Instead of pointing out this weakness the Oregonian promptly designates it as a pillar of strength "among citizens who seek righteousness."

Bah! Upon such double dealing and demagoguery! Harvey Scott must think the voters of Oregon are a lot of web-footed fish-eaters that he can fool them by such palpable misrepresentations as this which are handed out in his ponderous editorials. The people and the rank and file of the Republican party are aware of such moral turpitude.

A WISE YOUNG MAN.

TO BE ABLE to live on \$1 a week is some achievement, but to have attained the wisdom of the ages is a greater one. Earl V. M. Long, the young Harvard student who has attained such notoriety by his dietetic economies, has burst into print and fairly dazzles one with his long-headed and mature enunciations.

Mr. Long is not a faddist. He is not even a vegetarian. But he believes that there is a great deal of waste in the custom of eating and that a dollar's worth of food selected intelligently is worth more than \$15 worth selected at the whim of a French chef or the fancy of a robust but misinformed cook. Mr. Long is an athlete, but he takes his athletics with the same sanity and judgment that he takes his food. Last year he went abroad and travelled from Gibraltar through the Holy Land to Ireland at a total expense of \$200. "I have always left stimulants, narcotics and alcoholics alone," he says, "not so much because I consider their use immoral, but because I regard them as nonessentials."

Some one should suggest to President Lowell that a young man who achieves wisdom of this sort reflects credit upon the university quite as much as the man who hits the line hard or is able to knock a ball over the New Haven fence. Mr. Long should be given an "H."

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO PARENTS AND CHILDREN.

Section 7 of Ordinance No. 294 of the City of Marshfield provides:

"Any person who shall fire off or discharge any ordinance, gun, pistol, rifle or other firearm, or any squib, rocket, roman candle, chaser, fire-cracker, bomb, torpedo, dynamite cane or other fireworks of any kind or nature whatsoever within the corporate limits of the City of Marshfield shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder's court shall be punished as hereinafter provided; provided that the Mayor may permit upon any national holiday and other days of public celebrations, the discharge of cannon and fireworks within such limits and under such restrictions as he may deem proper.

The same ordinance also prohibits children being abroad upon the streets after 9 o'clock at night unless given special permission, upon important duty or when accompanied by parent or guardian.

This ordinance will be rigidly enforced, and to avoid trouble, parents are requested to see that their children comply with it.

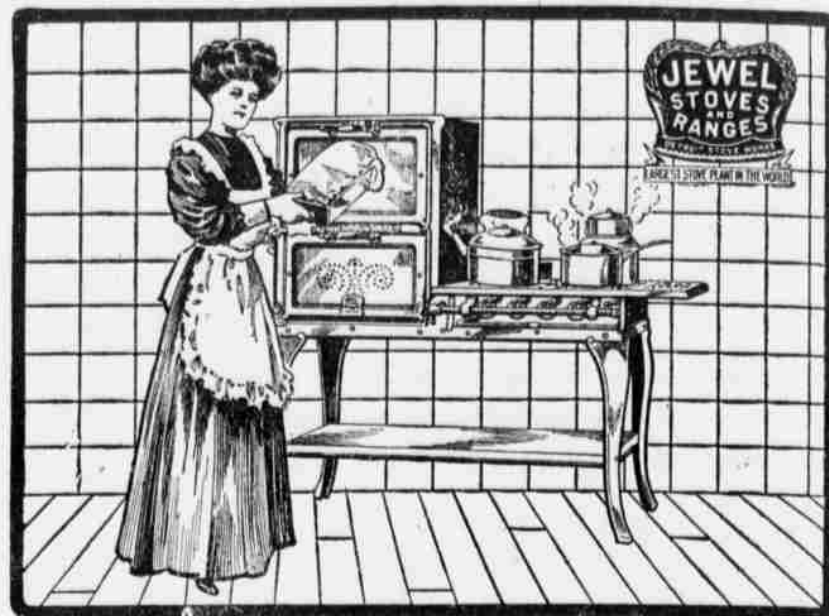
