Council Tuesday.—The Marshfield city council will meet to-morrow night to take up various city matters.

Meet Thursday.—A meeting of the business men of Marshfield has been called to be held at the Millicoma Club Thursday night to forward the proposed carnival in August.

Summer Wins.—At Summer yesterday, Summer defeated the North Slough ball team by a score of 14 to 6. There was a good crowd out for the game.

No Ball Game.—Owing to some of the members of the Marshfield baseball team being unable to go to Bandon yesterday, the trip was called off yesterday morning. Only a few had planned to go over with the team.

Not a Candidate.—J. M. Upton states that the report that he was a candidate for school director was erroneous. He left this morning for Coquille to attend court and may not even be able to attend the election this evening at the high school.

Gift to School.—A slab of the Parthenon frieze, the gift of the class of 1910 to the High School, has just arrived from Caproni Brothers, Boston. The slab is 42x56 inches and represents in low relief a portion of the Panathenaeic procession.

Hard Wind Sunday.—One of the worst southeast winds that has hit the Bay in a long time at this season of the year prevailed here yesterday. It did more or less damage, blowing down trees, small buildings, etc. At Peter Scott's Glen Gardens, many of his glass plant protectors were broken. The bay was quite choppy and a few small crafts were swamped. Later the wind swung around to the southwest and its effect was not felt so much.

Educational Conference.—Miss Nellie A. Montgomery, principal of the Marshfield High School, left this morning for Eugene to attend the educational conference at the University of Oregon. The leading educators in the State will be present, and such subjects as "Community Co-Operation with Schools," and

"School and Home Co-Operation" will be discussed. During the vacation, Miss Montgomery will visit the leading schools on the coast to secure ideas for improving the Marshfield schools.

Settles on Island.—Already "Shell Island," the new piece of land made in the middle of the Bay by the dredgings deposited opposite North Bend last summer by the Dredge Oregon, has been settled upon, some squatter moving his houseboat onto it and raising it above the tides.

Ship Machinery.—It is stated that the old jetty machinery at the government works or a large share of it will be taken to Celilo for use on the government project there in the near future. For the past few weeks, several men have been employed cleaning and boxing it up for shipment. It is, according to the understanding of the men here, to be loaded onto a barge and towed up by the tug Arago.

Catch Trout.—N. S. Olson, R. M. Boykin and Mr. Lovelace of Portland returned to-day from a few days' fishing at Ten Mile, during which they secured some fine strings of trout. Mr. Lovelace, who is a devout follower of Isaac Walton, is very enthusiastic over the Ten Mile sport and says that he and a dozen or so Portlanders will probably establish summer homes at Ten Mile.

Court in Session.—Judge John S. Coke arrived home from Portland yesterday and at Coquille to-day convened the adjourned term of Circuit Court to hear equity cases. Court Reporter Ira Riddle of Roseburg came in with him, the two coming via the old Coos Bay Wagon Road. No cases of particular importance are scheduled for trial this time except the case of the Port of Coos Bay vs. Hennessey, involving tide lands, which comes up for argument. A number of divorce cases are also to be disposed of.

DR. W. HAYDON, A. B. Smith, O. W. Briggs, M. A. Sweetman and friends left early Sunday morning by launch Traveler, Commodore George Wheeler in command, for Charleston Bay. While the rain was falling fast and furious last night the friends and families who have a cinch on the party were much alarmed for their safety, as there is no hotel where they camped, and they carry no insurance.
