The purchase price of the tract was in the neighborhood of \$25,000, but the exact figures were not given out by the purchasers. The timber on the tract will be placed on the market at once and as soon as sold will be logged off and the tract platted into city lots and placed on the market.

Yesterday A. W. Kelley reported that the statement made in these columns last week to the effect that his brother-in-law, A. A. Antoine, was dead was untrue. The announcement of his death was received a week ago but last Saturday a letter was received from his wife in which she states that Mr. Antoine is rapidly improving and that the doctor thinks he will be out in a few days.
