FIRST PASSENGER AIRSHIP MAKES LONG FLIGHT TODAY

Count Zeppelin Carries Twenty People 300 Miles in Quick Time.

MUCH FASTER THAN RAILROAD SERVICE.

Machine Works Perfectly and Is Equipped With Buffet Service.

(By Associated Press.) DUSSELDORF, Germany, June 22.—The first regular airship passenger service was inaugurated to-day when Count Zeppelin's great craft, The Deutschland, carrying twenty passengers, successfully made its first scheduled trip from Friederichshafen to this city, a distance of three hundred miles, in nine hours.

The Deutschland was given a tremendous ovation when she reached her landing in this city. The town was gaily decorated in honor of the event.

Regular trips will be made and many tickets for the first few days have been sold at from \$50 to \$75 each.

The airship is equipped with a restaurant, which will supply the passengers buffet service such as is accorded on railroad trains.

The dimensions are: Length, 485 feet; width, 46 feet; gas capacity, 24,852 cubic yards; horsepower, 350; lifting capacity, 44,000 pounds, of which 11,000 pounds cover the crew, passengers and express.

The designed speed is 35 miles an hour.

Count Zeppelin demonstrated the advantage of the air route over the section of country traversed. The Deutschland cut the railroad time one-third between Mannheim and Dusseldorf, cutting the time from six hours to four hours.

COUNCIL HAS BUSY SESSION

Takes Up Many Important Matters For Final Disposition Last Night.
