SOME REPRESENTATIVE EDITORIALS.

A STUDENT of journalism at the University of Washington has investigated the editorial department of eight daily newspapers in the United States. These dailies were representative papers, respectively of radical, intermediate and conservative character, and, therefore, the editorials fairly index what their readers are thinking of.

The investigator found that seven out of every ten of the editorials appealed to the intellect, only three to the feelings, and that the more saffron-fingered the paper, the more emotional editorials it had. The subjects of the leaders that appealed to the emotions included admiration, elation, humor, incongruity, regret and respect. Only 27 out of 313 editorials discussed commercial subjects, but 184 dealt with political questions and 132 with national affairs. Local subjects came next with 76 editorials, social science with 68, foreign affairs with 65 and State affairs with 40.

These statistics are not without interest, nor even without meaning. So far as they go, they contradict the claim that American newspapers are degenerating. The appeal to the reason by seven out of every ten editorials in eight representative newspapers argues that these dailies in the main are earnest and serious papers. The fact that only a twelfth of the 313 editorials handled commercial themes looks as if commercialism were not the curse of America. It is to be hoped that the student will investigate editorials comprehensively.

SHALL WE GO BACK?

GEORGE C. BROWNELL has turned "States' evidence" and is disclosing some startling things that occurred in the days when Oregon nominated candidates in conventions and when legislators elected United States Senators. Here are a few "incidents" to which he has referred:

A legislator received \$3,500 to remain out of Mitchell joint assembly in 1897.

A legislator received \$4,000 for changing his vote for Senator on last night of legislative session.

A legislator received \$100 and given whiskey every time he voted for a certain Senatorial candidate.

Five thousand dollars was given to go between for purchase of legislator's vote for United States Senator.

Nominee for Governor paid \$10,000 to one man and \$15,000 to quiet another faction.

Nominee for State Printer was forced to divide profits of his office with two others before the convention would nominate him.

Of course the average man did not know that such corruption existed in the "good old days" before the direct primary was adopted. Now that the rottenness has been disclosed by a man who was a typical leader under the old system, who would have Oregon go back into the slough of political corruption?

POULTRY FOR PROFIT.

THE RECEIPT by a Portland poultry dealer last week of 200 dozen spring chickens from Petaluma, California, has been commented upon by the press of the metropolis as indicating neglect of the poultry growing opportunities in Oregon. The Oregonian goes on to say that there is a much greater economic waste in the transaction than is apparent at first glance, for the California poultry growers are obliged to buy Oregon wheat as feed for their chickens. The Oregon poultrymen, if they would supply the home market, would thus have in their favor an additional margin of profit to the full amount of the freight on the feed from Oregon to California and on the chickens from California to Oregon. As it is reasonable to suppose that there was a profit for the Californians in thus paying freight both ways, it is quite clear that the Oregon poultrymen could make much greater profit out of the business than is being made by the Californians.
