

George Holder, Aged 16, and

Caught by Sheriff.

Deeds Were Committed Year Ago and Three Years Ago, Respectively.

George Holder, aged about sixteen, and Jas. Burleson, aged about twenty-nine, wanted in Mitchell and Mc-Dowell counties, North Carolina, for murders, are now in the county jail at Coquille awaiting the arrival of the North Carolina officers to take them back. Both have admitted their identity and the crimes, but claim self-defense, and that the deeds were committed during quarrels.

The two, who are cousins, were arrested by Sheriff Gage. Holder was caught in Coquille a few days ago and Burleson was captured at Lebanon, Oregon, and was brought back to Coquille tast evening by Sheriff Gage. He had formerly been working in the logging camps near Coquille with Holder, but recently went to Lebanon.

But little has been learned of their crimes here. Holder, who is about sixteen, commit ed the murder for which he is wanted about a year ago, and Burleson committed his crime about three years ago. Mitchell and McDowell are adjoining counties in North Carolina.

Holder has an older brother who is employed as a logger near Coquille. Both Holder and Burleson have been in the county for some time. While Sheriff Gage did not give the details of how they were located here, it is presumed they were apprehended through messages sent to their old home in North Carolina. 





(Special to The Times.) BANDON, Ore., June 28 .- by a vote of 117 to 91, Bandon yesterday voted down the ordinance prohibiting cows and live stock running at large in town. This ordinance probably stirred up more feeling than any other feature of the annual election, and the decision to fet live stock have the freedom of the town was a surprise. By a vote of 108 to 46, it was decided to issue \$60,000 honds to secure municipal waterworks.
