Postpone Meeting.—Chairman Tom Hall of the Coos County Democratic Central Committee has postponed indefinitely the meeting called for July 3d, owing to the inability of Coquille Valley members to be present.

Couple Weds.—Frederick D. Kruse and Miss Laura Escott were married Wednesday night by Rev. G. LeRoy Hall at his home in South Marshfield. The event came as a surprise to the young couple's many friends. Clearing Right-of-Way.—Chief Engineer F. A. Haines has started a force of men clearing the right-of-way on the route of the Coos Bay and Boise Railway between here and Coquille. The men are working on the Kruse place on Isthmus Inlet, where some additional surveying is necessary. President Clarke has not made any announcement of the company starting construction yet, but some believe the clearing begun to day constitutes construction. The original plans of the company were to begin construction on or before July 1st, 1910.
