FARM LAND TO BE TAKEN OUT

President Hill Wants Tracts Suitable For Agriculture Taken Out of Reserves.

President Hill of the Great North-ern, is sending the various commercial bodies in Oregon a copy of the Senate resolution providing a special committee to investigate the amount of land in the forest reserves that is suitable for agricultural purposes, with a view to making it available for settlement. This is a matter of the greatest importance to the development of this State, and will be a good thing for Oregon in the opinion of Mr. Hill. The resolution is as follows:

Resolution.

"Resolved, That there shall be appointed by the President of the Senate a select committee of five Senators, with authority to sit during the session of the Senate or during the recess of Congress, either as a committee or by a sub-committee, with instructions to make an exhaustive investigation of the lands now within forest reservations with a view of ascertaining how much and what part can be restored to the use of the people under the present laws.

"The committee is hereby authorized for the purpose of securing this information to hold such hearings as may be necessary; to have such printing and binding done as may be necessary; to employ a stenographer and other clerical assistance; and that the expenses to carry out the provisions of this resolution shall be paid from the contingent fund of the Senate."

BEATS UP NIGHTWATCH.

BANDON, Ore., June 28.—C. E. Hadley is now spending his nights in the city bastille and his days working on the streets as a result of a little escapade last Thursday night. Hadley had been drinking quite heavily and was somewhat quarrelsome when Nightwatchman Dibblee approached him and asked him if he had not better go to bed, whereupon Hadley without warning struck Dibblee, knocking him down and then jumping on him with both feet. Nightwatchman Ira Tucker was near by and ran to grab Hadley but could not reach him until he had bruised Dibblee up quite badly. Hadley was taken to the city jail and lodged for the night, and on Friday morning was taken before Judge Topping, where he pleaded guilty and was given twenty days in jail and \$50 fine. He has no money with which to pay his fine, so he will have until about August 1st to work for the city and ponder over his deed.
