THE ASSEMBLY WORKS SMOOTH

Bennett moved that it proceed to fill the county ticket at once, and Col. Rosa seconded him. Then Col. Rosa presented the name of W. J. Butler of Marshfield for Coroner. Tom Bennett seconded it and moved that the nominations be closed. The motion carried and on motion by Judge Sehlbrede, the nomination was made by acclamation.

Walter Sinclair reported that he understood that John Yokam would not accept the Assembly's nomination for Sheriff and suggested that another man be secured. S. B. Cathcart, Mr. Dement and W. J. Butler promptly stated this was not correct as Mr. Yokam had informed them that he would run and make the best fight he could for the place.

On motion by Col. Grimes, the County Assembly Committee was instructed to see that the nominating petitions for the candidates the assembly had brought out were properly filed.

On motion of Judge Sehlbrede, the Assembly proceeded to the selection of thirty-seven delegates to the State Assembly, and a recess was called and the delegates chosen during a conference of representatives of the various delegations present. Fred K. Gettins had previously prepared a tentative list of State delegates. The list selected was printed in The Times yesterday.

After the recess, there was an animated debate as to a means of insuring a full delegation from Coos county at the State Assembly. J. W. Bennett and Col. Rosa were opposed to proxies being allowed and finally it was agreed to leave the matter of filling vacancies to the County Central Committee. Each of the delegates chosen is to notify Chairman Phelan a week or so prior to the State Assembly, July 21st, whether or not he will be able to go, and if he can't to suggest a possible alternate.

J. W. Bennett reported that the central committee was about \$60 in debt for expenses incurred in connection with the Assembly and asked this be made up. A recess was called and the various delegates contributed to "the hat" with the result that \$37 was raised and \$3 more pledged. A suggestion by Col. Grimes that a campaign fund be raised for the primary was not adopted. J. W. Bennett stating that was up to the candidates.

On motion by J. W. Bennett, seconded by W. H. Bunch, the Coos County Central Committee was instructed to select a man for Joint Representative from Coos and Curry counties in case Curry county doesn't hold an assembly.

They found Mr. Tenuison on the streets looking after the lines of the Home Telephone Co., and was upon a pole when the gentlemen went to him, and he descended to talk to them. When near the bottom of the pole Mr. Tenuison made a jump for the ground when the strap of one of his climbers caught on one of the iron

pins in the pole and Tom was left suspended by one foot head downward. Mr. Hudson at once went to his assistance. Tom had placed his other climber into the pole and would have soon been head up, and when Hudson got hold of him this climber slipped from the pole and the other from the pin, and he came down in such a manner that the gaff on one of his climbers struck Mr. Hudson in the leg between the ankle and knee inflicting quite a serious wound. A deep gash was cut in the leg, severing arteries and veins from which there was a great loss of blood. Mr. Hudson will be off duty for some time."
