neer would permit as it would give him a better foundation.

Are After Plumber.

Councilman Savage reported that Plumber Rust was not complying with the city plumbing ordinance and was putting in inferior work. He said that the other plumbers who were complying with the ordinance and bidding on jobs were angry about it and didn't think it was right. Sewer Inspector Tribbey was called upon and said it was true—that he had refused to pass some of Mr. Rust's jobs and notified him to make them comply to the ordinance, but that Mr. Rust had not done so. Mayor Straw told Mr. Tribbey to swear out a complaint against Mr. Rust before City Recorder Butler and Mr. Tribbey said he was waiting for City Attorney Goss to return.

Other Business.

The liquor licenses of all the saloons in town were renewed, the licenses being paid and the proper applications being made.

An ordinance giving the mail boats right of way at the city docks and providing a penalty for any boat remaining tied up at the city dock more than two hours was adopted.

The city engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for rebuilding the elevated roadway on Curtis avenue from Broadway to Fourth street.

W. C. Deubner offered to make the necessary change in his property to enable the city to straighten out the streets in that part of town for \$750. The council had offered him \$350 and declared his demand was exorbitant. It was referred to the finance committee.

The front street sewer question was brought up and City Engineer Sandberg urged that it be attended to at once. He said that it could be done more cheaply by private enterprise—theyYos etalon etalon ea tract if the property owners would consent. Councilman Nelson, who is one of the property owners, said that every man should pay for repairing it in front of his own property. It is all right in front of his property. The councilmen declared that the property owners would either have to fix it themselves or else the city would attend to it and assess the cost to them in the usual way. It developed that the sewer originally was put in at the expense of the city, the property owners not having had to pay for it as the property owners are now having to do in other parts of the town. The matter will be attended to as soon as City Attorney Goss returns.

After the bills had been allowed, a warrant was ordered drawn for \$75 in favor of the city library. Councilman Nelson voted against it. Then Councilman Albrecht made a motion that the city attorney be instructed to draft the necessary ordinance to submit the library question to the voters at the next city election and let them provide a fund for its maintenance if they desire it. Councilman Nelson voted against this, but it carried. Mr. Nelson said the people would vote to maintain the library.

Hugh McLain's North Broadway contract was accepted. Owing to the litigation, etc., this project has been hanging fire for three years.

Mrs. Gammill's bill for about \$75 for extra work she alleged was caused by a sewer "y" not being put in properly was refused. Councilman Coke said he had a hole dug down to the sewer and found the "y" where it ought to be, despite Mrs. Gammill's claim.
