New Factory.—Arrangements are being made to open a small broom factory at Eastside.

Meet Saturday.—The "Busy Bees," an organization of the younger girls of the Swedish Lutheran Church, will meet at the Alfred Johnson home in Bunker Hill Saturday afternoon.

Grange Meeting.—The next regular meeting of the Grange will be held in Marshfield on the last Saturday of the month, July 30th, and not on the fourth Saturday as previously stated.

Strengthen Building.—J. W. Bennett and Richard Walter are having the old log foundation of their Front street building, occupied by the Magnes & Matson store, strengthened materially. Concrete is being used instead of timber this time.

Dr. Tower Better.—Jay Tower yesterday received a letter from his mother in Portland stating that Dr. Tower is getting along nicely. However, it will be a couple of weeks before he will have recovered sufficiently to be brought home.

To Roseburg.—Judge John S. Coke will leave the last of this week for Roseburg, where he will try some cases for Judge Hamilton. He may also go to Portland and hear some arguments in the Hindu riot cases from St. Johns, Oregon, before he returns.

Brush Fire.—A brush clearing fire on Pony Slough reached rather alarming proportions yesterday, the smoke settling over West Marshfield to an extent to cause considerable anxiety. However, it was reported that the fire was under control and would do no damage.

Drill For Oil.—John D. Hayes is here from Bandon on business. He reports that there is considerable excitement in and around Bandon over the arrangements being made to drill for oil. Strong indications of oil have been found and oil experts are now arranging to sink a well or two to definitely determine the extent of the deposits.

Gather Bank Data.—Marshfield banks have been called upon to furnish a special report of their condition June 30th, giving additional data besides that usually found in the statements, for the benefit of the Monetary Commission appointed by Congress to investigate the American banking system. The commission hopes to include every bank in the nation in its report.

Old Friend Dead.—Harry G. Hoy has received word of the death of ex-Congressman John A. Pickler at Faulkton, S. D., one of his oldest and best friends. Mr. Hoy studied law in Mr. Pickler's office before he took his college course and during the two years was a member of the Pickler household. Mr. Pickler had a long public record, having served in three sessions of Congress, in the Dakota Legislature and also served in the Department of the Interior.
