Events There As Recorded By The Gold Beach Globe.

The Martha of Eureka, a beautiful fishing smack, was in here viewing our harbor and fishing grounds.

A boat just arrived this morning from Eureka, manned by a Greek crew, and is laying at anchor in our harbor.

All previous hunting records were broken Wednesday when Andrew Wridge and Walter Fry killed four panthers before dinner.

Farmers are preparing to apply the sickle to their hay fields. Crops of all descriptions are looking well. Fruits of all kinds are causing the branches to feel their weight.

Last week the Kingfisher of Eureka was out on the fishing grounds and caught twenty halibut averaging eighty pounds, which she took to Eureka. She did so well on the first trip that she will fish all summer along our shore.

W. A. Bishel returned Tuesday evening from a trip to the north end of the county, where he has been interviewing the voters of that section. He has announced his candidacy for Sheriff on the Republican ticket.

The crab fleet made a good catch of crabs last week which were at once taken to Eureka by a steam schooner made for the purpose. She is equipped with a large tank in her hold, through which salt water constantly flows. By this method they deliver the crabs fresh and alive.

S. P. Pierce of Sixes River was on our streets last Friday. He came in on the Ranger Thursday evening from Port Orford. Although Mr. Pierce was here on private business, he was also sizing up the political situation and says he may yet become a candidate for Joint Representative for Coos and Curry counties.

W. H. Caughell has given notice that he will apply to the County Court at the July term for a license to operate a ferry between this place and Wedderburn. This will be good news to the travelling public and the people of the surrounding country, as much inconvenience has been experienced of late by those wishing to cross the river.
