ONE MAN POWER.

THE DEMOCRATIC BOSSES and organs have overreached themselves in fighting the Republican assembly," says the Oregonian.

It is not the Republican assembly. It is "my assembly." The fighting is not by Democratic bosses. It is by Republicans. The men who protested against the scheme in the Lane county convention at Eugene were not Democrats, but Republicans. J. L. Kruse, who is calling upon the Republicans of Clackamas county to beat the scheme, is not a Democrat, but a Republican. The Republican central committee of Tillamook which resolved against the holy convocation of "my intellectuals" is not composed of Democrats, but of good Republicans. The members of the Republican central committee of Union county, who adjourned without electing delegates, are not Democrats, but long-time Republicans. George C. Brownell, who delivered a powerful philippic against "my plan," is not a Democrat, but a staunch Republican. Judge Henry McGinn, whose ringing protest against the proposed return to conventionalism still echoes throughout the State, is not a Democrat, but a Lincoln Republican. Judge Lowell of Pendleton, whose protests have been most vigorous, is not a Democrat, but a Republican of the good old fashioned school. A. M. Crawford, who has filed his notice of candidacy for the Republican nomination for attorney-general, is not a Democrat, but two times Republican attorney-general of the State. County Clerk Frank Fields and Sheriff Robert Stevens, whose candidacies for re-election are a protest against the assembly, and who have been assailed by the Oregonian for it, are not Democrats, but staunch direct primary Republicans. Honorable Austin T. Buxton, late master of the State grange, whose splendid protests against the assembly were widely published and everywhere commended, is not a Democrat, but a Republican to the core. The scores of granges throughout Oregon whose resolutions of protest are a warning from the masses against the convention madness, are not "Democratic bosses," but made up of a membership that is largely Republican. Not a single prominent Democrat in the State has been heard denouncing the assembly. The protest is from Republicans and thousands of them who resent a plan originated by one man, demanded principally by one man, proposing that the law shall be set aside and a new system of nomination installed at the behest of one man, and that the votes of the 56,205 citizens who adopted the direct primary system shall count nothing against the will of one man.—Journal.

no provision in the law for calling a special election. If Mr. Bennett's amendment is not carried no harm will have been done, as the voters will simply have approved or disapproved of the harbor improvements contemplated by the Commission.

The president and the attorney for the port were instructed to visit San Francisco and confer with dredging companies with a view of securing if possible immediate relief in the way of dredging and to secure a provisional contract for the improvement work in case that the ordinance is carried by the voters. In this way, when the voters approve, the port will be in shape to proceed immediately with the improvement work.

It was also voted by the Commissioners to mark by properly numbered piles the channels of the various inlets tributary to the bay, and the engineer was instructed to make plans and specifications to submit for bids.
