BOTH CLAIM SELF DEFENSE

North Carolina Men Charged With Murder to Be Taken Back Soon.

The Sheriff from Mitchell county, North Carolina, is expected here in a few days to get George Holder, one of the two men who are wanted for murder in North Carolina, and who are under arrest in the Coos county jail.

Holder is only nineteen years of age, and the crime for which he is wanted was committed in September, 1909. He claims that he acted in self-defense. The boy says that he was pursued by a man who threatened him bodily harm and that he took out his knife and cut the other man in the hopes of checking further pursuit, and claims that he did not intend to inflict a mortal wound.

John Burleson, the other man who is wanted for murder and is also under arrest, is twenty-nine years old, and is a cousin of Holder and lived in McDowell county, North Carolina, which adjoins the county in which Holder lived. Burleson killed a man for whom he was working. He says that he quarreled with his employer and that he shot him in self-defense.

The two men came to Oregon and have been together part of the time while in Coos county. They evidently hoped to escape being found in this part of the country, but they were located here and the Sheriff placed them both under arrest. Holder will probably be taken back next week and an officer will come for Burleson later on.

months the road be built on all of the streets on which the franchise is given. He asked that if he has a mile of track built within the specified time in the city limits that he will be meeting with the requirements if he has built outside the city limits and connecting with the one mile of track, road of sufficient length to equal the distance on the other streets on which he is now required to build in the city within eighteen months. In other words, he wants his franchise to be good if within eighteen months from the time it was passed he builds a road which will equal the length of the proposed road in the city, and that one mile of this road must be in the city and the rest of it outside the city. After explaining his wants, it was suggested at once that the City Attorney should be present. It was stated that Mr. Goss would be home most any time, and without any discussion on the part of the councilmen the matter was referred to the council as a committee of the whole to be taken up as soon as the City Attorney could be present.

made only fifty feet wide, in which case it would not be necessary to change the property on one side of the street. The question was left open after some discussion on the part of the councilmen. An investigation will be made to see just what can be done.

Sewer Complaint.

C. A. Johnson made a complaint about the sewer in West Marshfield. He said that he was assessed \$345, and that the sewer was on such a grade that it would do him no good if he should build on his property. He said he did not mind paying a small amount for the general good of the city but that the amount of his assessment was too great for him to pay without his property being benefited. Mayor Straw said that there had been a number of complaints of different kinds about the sewer and he thought it all ought to be investigated.

It was referred to the health committee to investigate.

Other Business.

A complaint about the grade at Fourth and Elrod was referred to the street committee to straighten out.

Some of the property owners on Elrod avenue want an eight foot sidewalk instead of a six-foot walk. The council decided to consider the change if a proper petition was brought in.
