CURRY COUNTY NEWS.

Events There As Told By the Gold Beach Globe.

Mrs. A. R. Zumwalt, who some time ago contested the J. O. Langworthy homestead on Greggs Creek, has succeeded in getting a homestead filing on it and is now having a neat, new cottage built thereon.

Wm. Morton, who owns a homestead near the road about eight miles this side of Chetco River, was in town one night since our last issue. Mr. Morton is cultivating the black cap raspberry which grows very prolific in Curry county. He expects to gather about 600 gallons of this fruit this year.

M. Lucas is relieving his sheep of some extra heavy fleeces. Several yearlings sheared over nine pounds. His flock has increased so fast that he has been compelled to sell fifty head to the Fry boys to avoid overstocking the range. He endeavored to keep the number down by supplying the county with mutton, but the lambs came too fast.

The crab fishing fleet at Harbor caught over thirty hundred pounds of halibut on July 2d. The fish were taken to Crescent City, where they were disposed of at 8 cents per pound. There are many known banks of halibut fishing grounds off the coast of Curry, which some day will contribute thousands of dollars to the wealth of the county.

Mr. Herbert Payne and W. W. Hatfield, who are engaged pooling chitlin bark on the upper Chetco, have been missing bark for some time, says our correspondent. On going to work one morning lately, they saw a panther leave the place where they had the bark piled to dry. The panther had eaten and destroyed about 500 pounds of dried bark. IN MEMORIAM.

Abraham Cutlip was born in Pocahontas county, Virginia, on Christmas Day, 1825. He died July 10, 1910, at the home of his son, M. D. Cutlip, having reached the ripe old age of 84 years, 6 months and 15 days.

On Jan. 25, 1849, he was married to Miss Harriet Eliza Cook of Cedar county, Iowa. This faithful companion passed to her eternal home in April, 1895. To this union was born seven children, one having died in infancy. Leonard C. Cutlip and Mrs. Henry Laeross, both deceased, M. D. Cutlip, Mrs. William Bonebrake, Mrs. Alvin Smith and Mrs. S. B. Cutlip, all of Coos county, Oregon. In January, 1897, he was married to Miss Lucy Brittenbush. To this union was born a daughter, Miss Ary, of Grafton, Cal.

In 1850, Mr. Cutlip, with his family, left their home in Iowa and started for Oregon. Reaching Salt Lake City late in the fall they decided to spend the winter there, but early in the spring they again resumed their long and perilous journey across the plains with their ox teams. In the winter of 1851 they reached Lane county, Oregon, where they made their home until 1860 when they came down to Coos county, and purchased the farm on Coos River, at which Mr. Cutlip had made his home all these years. Mr. Cutlip can truly be called an old pioneer of Oregon. Coming here at an early day when white men were few, and toll, hardship and sacrifice were plenty he had held no little part in the development of our county.

When but a youth, Mr. Cutlip decided to follow Jesus Christ and upon his knees he promised God that if he would forgive him his sins he would consecrate his life to Christian service. From this purpose his faith never wavered. A few days before he died he assured his children that his hope was still bright, and that he was not afraid to cross through the valley and the shadow of death for his Saviour had promised that at "evening time it shall be light." He spent over sixty-eight years in the service of his Lord. He was a member of the Radical United Brethren Church. In his last lingering illness he was brave and patient. He will be mourned by his wife and children and a host of friends and neighbors, who will ever remember him as a friend of righteousness and truth. May God bless us to fight the good fight, and to hold fast to the faith that will enable us to meet him in the home beyond the skies.
