BOOZE IS GOING UP.

That Is the Price Is While the Liquor Is Going Down in Medford.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 15.—Beer is no longer 5 cents nor whiskey 10 cents a glass in Medford saloons. Hereafter the thirsty will have to pay 10 cents for beer and mixed drinks, and bottled goods will be 15 cents. This raise in the price of wet goods, the liquor dealers claim, is due to the \$1,000 license now to be paid by the saloons as a result of an increase ordered by the council, the annual license heretofore being \$800. Medford now has ten saloons. The only other wet towns in Jackson county are Jacksonville with four saloons, Gold Hill with four and Woodville with one. Two years ago the county voted "dry" but the courts declared the election illegal. The prohibitionists are preparing to have the question voted on again at the election this fall.

Newspaper at Bandon Claims City Was Mistreated.
