LOOKING FOR DAIRY LAND

Danish Expert Would Locate Colonists From His Country in Oregon.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—To find available dairying districts in the northwest where colonies of Danish dairymen may settle is one of the missions of Professor Bernhard Boeggild, of the Danish-American Agricultural College of Denmark, who is now visiting the Pacific Coast.

The professor is inspecting the various dairying districts of the Northwest, learning the methods in use, the system followed by the farmers in milk production, manufacture into dairy products and marketing, and the outlook here for the further spread of the industry.

Professor Boeggild will lecture before the State Medical Association on the afternoon of Wednesday, July 20, at the Portland Commercial Club, and on the same night he will speak before the State Dairymen's Association at the same place.

CHINA'S REPLY MADE.

Satisfaction Expressed Regarding the Russo-Japanese Matter.

PEKIN, China, July 21.—China's reply to the announcement of the recently concluded Russo-Japanese convention was delivered to the legations of these two countries to-day, and in general there was an expression of satisfaction with the terms, especially those which expressed the purpose of Russia and Japan to adhere to the terms of the Portsmouth treaty and the mutual pledge of the maintenance status quo of the open door principle in Manchuria.

POLICE FIND TRACE OF DR. CRIPPEN

Believe He Is Man Who Was Travelling in France and Woman Who Committed Suicide May Be His Companion.

(By Associated Press.) VERNOT LES BAINS, France, July 21.—Photographs of Crippen shown to persons who saw a stranger who stopped here over Sunday, in every instance brought forth the statement that Crippen and the stranger are identical. He registered as Henri Tarbot.

The announcement of Talbot, or Crippen, that he was going to Spain threw the police off their guard for a time, but they now believe he is still in France. Warrants have been issued for his arrest.

SHOW CITY HALL PLANS

On Exhibition For Inspection of Public at Chamber of Commerce Rooms.

The plans and sketch of the proposed new city hall have been put on exhibition at the Chamber of Commerce rooms. When the city council recently appointed a committee to look into the matter of securing fireproof protection for the city's documents, the committee reported back that a new city hall would be the best improvement that could be made and submitted plans for a fireproof structure which would cost \$35,000.

The plans provide for a two-story structure. On the first floor at the front is an inspector's office on one side and the recorder's office on the other side. At the back is a city council room and also a vault, marshal's office and city jail.

HEAT CAUSES DEATH.

He reports no special developments on Coos Bay during his recent trip there, but he expects to see two or three railroads built in there in the near future. He very properly holds that there is plenty of room for the Roseburg, Drain and Eugene lines, as each would have a territory and traffic not touched by any of the others. He also holds that it will be easier to get the second and third lines built than the first, whichever it may be. It is expected that at least two of these roads will be built simultaneously, and perhaps all of them.
