## TREADGOLD TREADS AIR

Assembly Candidate For Legislature Has No Foundation For Defense.

EDITOR OF THE TIMES: G. T. Treadgold, member of the late County Assembly and Assembly candidate for Representative has been heard from.

G. T., like many others of his faith, seems to have a faculty for misstating and misconstruing the position of those who oppose the Assembly; he has wasted much printer's ink in an attempt to disprove something nobody disputes. G. T. seems to imagine he has something up a tree, when the fact is he is simply making faces at a knot. Nobody disputes the right of G. T. and his associates to assemble and petition to their hearts' content—the constitutions and the laws of the country guarantees them that right.

The trouble with G. T. is that he fails to discriminate between a body of men speaking and acting for themselves alone and a body of men speaking and acting in a representative capacity, speaking and acting for somebody else. Every man has an undoubted right to bind himself, to speak and act for himself, but rarely has he the right to bind, act or speak for another.

If the late county Assembly and its alleged delegates had spoken and acted for themselves only and alone, then and in that case, nobody could complain; but they were not content to do that; they assumed to act and speak for others, they assumed to act in a representative capacity, they assumed to act and speak for the Republican party of Coos county, they assumed to act and speak for every man in that county, in that party whether he believed in the Assembly or not; they sought to bind every man in that party by their acts in so far as they possibly could; they claim that the nominations that they there made are the nominees of the Republican party for Coos county and that every Republican is in duty bound to support them. On the other hand, some of us who do not believe in the Assembly, hold that the Assembly did not represent the Republican party of Coos county, or any of its adherents, except themselves; that they did not act in a representative capacity in any respect, that none of their acts are binding upon anybody but themselves; that the candidates nominated thereon; are not the nominees of the Republican party; that the party as such is under no obligation whatever to support any of them at the primary, because there is no law giving anybody any right to elect any delegates or to hold any assembly or to nominate any candidates; because the Republican party of Coos county did not authorize anybody to elect any delegates or hold any assembly or nominate any candidates; because the Republican party as such never did elect any delegates, nor hold any assembly, nor make any nominations. The county central committee in call-

ing an election of delegates and the holding of an assembly for the Republican party acted without the scope of their authority; no such authority was given them by the law, or by the party.

Their acts in the matter were purely voluntary and unauthorized. The delegates were elected principally by their own votes; they boosted themselves into position by laying hold of the seat of their own pants; it was a self-appointed and self-constituted assembly—a rank usurpation of authority. Because the Democrats or somebody else have held assemblies is no reason why the Republicans should do likewise; if the Democrats have done anything of the sort that did not make it right. The Assembly folks loudly proclaim that they want an assembly to preserve party organization, to formulate party platforms, to confer about candidates, etc.—but always speak softly about making nominations; they purringly call it "suggesting candidates." Eliminate the question of nominating candidates and Statement No. 1 from the assembly scheme and it would be as dead as Pharaoh. The main purpose and object of the assembly is to name and control the candidates and obliterate Statement No. 1. All the rest is merely incidental. There is concerted action on the part of the politicians backed by the monied interests to discredit the direct primary and Statement No. 1, not only in this State but throughout the union. Listen to this clipped from the editorial pages of the Oregonian of July 14, 1910: "A further leading purpose of the assembly is to eliminate Statement No. 1 from any part or use in Republican politics. To this end, every candidate for the Legislature and every candidate for the United States Senate will be questioned. Those who 'take' Statement No. 1, as some may continue to do as a last expedient for obtaining nominations, should understand from the beginning that every effort will be made to beat them both in primary and in election, by all Republicans worth the name. Against all pretended Republicans who 'take' Statement No. 1 throughout Oregon, 'the knife' will be used with utmost vigor and the knife to the hilt."

The iron heel and the mailed fist are here apparent; these are the tyrannical words of the father and standard bearer of the assembly. This tyrant insists that the assembly shall "suggest" candidates for the voters, but forbids the voters to "suggest" at the polls their choice for United States Senator.

What do you think of this, anyway? Is it not simply a question of rule or ruin? If the assembly buccaneers are so anxious to preserve the party in act, why do they not somewhere tender the olive branch? Why do they force the issue when it is apparent that their acts must read the party from center to circumference?

If the acts of the assembly folks warrant the conclusion that they are trying to take some undue and unfair advantage and involve us again in machine politics they should not complain.

Space forbids a further review of the first epistle of G. T. at this time. In conclusion, I beg to say that I reckon G. T. as one of my friends; he is a good fellow, but is on the wrong trail. I think he is in the wake of the distinguished statesman
