YOUNG BLOODS ARE BEATEN

Game Sunday For Benefit of the Band Is Big Success.

The feature of the baseball season on Coos Bay was the game Sunday afternoon between the "Old Stiffs" and the "Youngbloods," which was arranged for the benefit of the Coos Bay Band. It was a great success in every way. The game was a close one, it being necessary to play ten innings before the young bloods were subdued, and the spectators surely got their money's worth. From a financial standpoint, the undertaking was also a success. The total receipts amounted to \$77.75. All of this money goes to the band and will be applied to the fund for the new uniforms.

There was a good deal of betting on the game. The friends of the young team had their pockets lined ready to take up any offer of the other side, and their pocketbooks were pretty well cleaned out after the game, but they took their losses without a murmur.

The "Young Bloods" went to bat first. Wright struck out the first man at bat, who was Merchant. The next four made hits, but the base running was poor and only one run was scored. The bloods held down the old ones for three straight innings, Johnson doing some clever pitching. In the fourth inning, the old fellows made a rally and brought in one run.

In the fifth inning, the young players broke loose and got in three runs, putting the game in a very different light and bringing forth yells of enthusiasm. In the sixth, the old stiffs pulled themselves together, and it was here that Jack Snyder shined. There were two men on bases and Snyder was at bat. He drove one to the fence and brought in the two men, but was caught at third. In the eighth inning the youngsters got in a run and this left the score 5 to 3, which made it look rather dark for the old stiffs. Nasburg and Tower both made fine hits, and two runs were tallied, which tied the score. Then there was something doing in the grand stand in the line of yelling. When it came to the tenth inning the youngsters lost all hope of winning in that inning by going out in one, two, three order.

When the old stiffs went to bat, Ferry walked to first, getting the base on balls. Keane made a hit and went to first, McKeown made a hit and sent Keane to second, but Ferry was forced out on third. Keane and McKeown made a double steal and went to third and second. Then Nasburg came to bat, lined a hit to centerfield and scored Keane, winning the game.

The "Young Bloods" were probably not as well organized as the "Old Stiffs." Their base running was a little short, and the old ones held their hands a little better. But both sides did some good playing. Snyder and Nasburg did the most effective work with the bat for the old team. Johnson, who pitched for the young team, did his best work when men

were on bases and in the most critical times.

Curry County Man Produces Some Which Break Record.

J. R. Hill of Gold Beach, Curry county, has dug some especially large potatoes, according to the Globe. Three of the potatoes dug by Mr. Hill, laid end to end measured 17 inches. Laid side by side they measured 12 1/2 inches. The potatoes were raised on hill land 1,700 feet above sea level and were not planted until about the first of April. Had these potatoes been left in the ground until fully matured the three would have filled an ordinary wood-box.
