PINCHOT'S PRINCIPLES THE RISING SUN OF THE NEW DAY.

M. R. PINCHOT has something to say every time he addresses the public. He also knows how to say it so as to catch the public ear. His address at Kansas City on July 15th, contained these ringing announcements:

The last session of Congress did great work for conservation. The fundamental idea of this is to make America a better home for the race and the race better Americans. A new school of politics is coming. This will decide whether special interests shall run the United States, or the people rule. The salvation of a nation lies in not being satisfied.

The sort of politics to which Mr. Pinchot alluded is here already. It came when Washington and Jefferson and Adams entered American politics, for all of them were men of means who entered public life from motives purely patriotic. It came again when, for the same reasons, Roosevelt, Pinchot, Hughes and the Garfields took up public careers. Its return means a new sense of duty to the State and a new standard of political life.

These men stand out prominently. Everybody sees and appreciates Hughes giving up the certainty of a \$100,000 legal practice for the sake of serving his country as a Justice of the Supreme Court with an income only one-tenth as large. But there are hundreds of equally worthy, if lesser leaders, who make similar sacrifices. Bristow of Kansas is such a man. Ostracized on account of his political opinions, he declares, he accepts the ostracism for the sake of the progressive people whom he represents and refuses to apologize for his votes.

It is the divine discontent of the Pinchots and Hugheses with diseased conditions in the body politic, it is the readiness of the Bristows to suffer for principle, that insure the social salvation of the American people. Cannon and Pinchot together at Kansas City rang out the old and rang in the new. Pinchot's principles are the rising sun of the new day.

NEWS OF LOCAL SPORTS.

It appears from what those on the outside who come to Coos Bay say that the stage road from Roseburg to this city is quite as good as most of the roads to the coast. One man from Hood River, who was here in his auto recently, shipped his machine from Hood River to Portland and then made the trip to Coos Bay in his auto, and was highly pleased. The road from Eugene to the coast seems to be no better and perhaps not as good as the Coos Bay route. The following appeared in a Eugene paper: "The trip over the coast mountains to Newport is seldom made in an automobile, but a Eugene party, H. F. Hollenbeck and wife, L. R. Wattis and S. B. Flanagan, made the run from Eugene in good time last Saturday in a Rambler car. They started from this city at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and arrived at the coast resort about 12 o'clock that night. They found the roads in fairly good shape, but as they are not extensively used by automobiles, they were not the best for motoring."

REPAIRING COURT HOUSE.

Work of Making Improvements Is Nearly Completed.

The repair and alteration work on the court house under the efficient supervision of Contractor Stauff of Marshfield is nearly completed, there remaining perhaps another week of work before it is entirely finished. The lavatory at the west side of the court house has been completed for several days and the new room for the typewriters and abstract people in the basement under the clerk's office is now finished with the exception of some finishing work following the plumbers.

The new furnace is installed and this week nearly all the radiators have been tried out and found to be working in good shape. The installation of the new furnace and the building of the room for the clerks of the office and the abstractors will give the Coos County court house quarters which are equal in convenience to those of any county in the State and will also be a vast improvement over the old offices and furnace. —Coquille Valley Sentinel.

NEW COAST MAP.

Engineer Robinson Has Completed an Extensive Work.

Engineer Robinson has completed a map of the Southern Oregon coast country, which is more complete and comprehensive than anything of the kind that has yet been made. It takes in all the territory from the Umpqua River down to Port Orford and extends back about thirty miles from the coast line. The map shows all the general divisions. In its present shape, it would occupy most of the wall in some offices, but it will be reproduced into a roll map and used in that way.

NEGRO KILLS TWO WOMEN.

Former Colored Soldier on Rampage at El Paso.

EL PASO, Tex., July 25.—Frank Lawson, a negro, and formerly a member of the Twenty-fifth U. S. Infantry, colored, and among those dismissed from the service following the "shooting up" of Brownsville, forced his way into the home of his father-in-law, C. C. Shelton, to-day and shot his wife and mother-in-law and ran away. Postmaster Smith, who was passing, attempted to capture the negro. The latter fired but missed. Smith grappled and the negro pressed a gun into the postmaster's stomach, pulled the trigger but missed fire. The negro was overpowered, and officers rescued him from the mob just in time to prevent a lynching. The women will die.
