WANTS FRUIT EXHIBITS.

Secretary of Chamber of Commerce Asks For Specimens.

Several fine specimens of fruit grown in this county have been exhibited this year at the Chamber of Commerce rooms, but Miss Violet Henderson, the secretary, is anxious to get all she can in the way of exhibits. She has written letters to many of the fruit growers asking them to send in what they can and especially to have exhibits here in time for the carnival of the middle of August. LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF INTEREST.

"Marshfield people are great fruit eaters," remarked F. S. Dow, yesterday. "During the past week it has taken five tons of apricots, 800 watermelons and 250 boxes of peaches to satisfy their appetites, meeting present desires and future needs. This, too, in addition to the immense amount of smaller fruit, berries, etc., which is consumed here every day."

MAY BUILD A MILL.

Brooking Company Representatives Are in Curry County.

It appears that there is a possibility of the Brookings Lumber and Box Company of California building a sawmill in Curry county. The company owns 25,000 acres of timber land in Curry and is the largest timber holder in that county. Members of the company are now looking over the property. The Gold Beach Globe has the following regarding the visit of the members of the company:

Robert S. Brookings and Walter D. Brookings and wife, of the Brookings Lumber and Box Company, arrived in town last night from the north. The two, in company with W. J. Ward, will look over a part of the company's extensive timber holdings in the Pistol River locality. Before leaving the country they will also look over the shipping point and mill sites, after which definite plans will be made as to their future operations.

HOLDER TAKEN BACK.

Officers From North Carolina Evidently Were Not Friendly.

George Holder, the second of the two prisoners wanted in North Carolina for murder, was taken overland from Coquille by Sheriff J. W. Brant of Mitchell county, N. C. The other prisoner, Burleson, was taken out last week by way of Coos Bay. The prisoners were wanted in adjoining counties, but it appears that there was not very good feeling between the officers from the two places. The deputy sheriff who came through this city seemed to want to avoid the officer who was coming for Holder, and Brant, the sheriff who took Holder out, is quoted as saying that he did not want to go back to North Carolina in company with Burleson and his keeper.

URNS OVER BUSINESS.

North Bend Mercantile Company Put in Hands of I. S. Smith.

The North Bend Mercantile Company, conducting a grocery business at North Bend, has turned over its business to I. S. Smith to act in the nature of a receiver for the company. The firm owes about \$15,000 and has assets consisting of stock of goods, real estate and accounts said to be valued at about \$18,000. Mr. Smith will be in full charge of the business and will conduct it and pay off its indebtedness. He is taking an invoice and will later be able to make a statement of the financial condition of the company.

CAR STRIKES AN AUTO.
