Some Comment, Caustic and Otherwise on Coos Bay Conditions by the Quiet Observer.

Some Coos Bay people's idea of resting on Sunday is to do everything around home they haven't been able to do during the week. Some believe in eating ten hours on the Sabbath, so they will be sick all day Monday, and some, in fact the majority, endeavor to impress their authority and discipline upon their children enough Sunday to last the balance of the week.

The taxation under which the people were ground down in ancient times, or with which such nations as Turkey and China are impoverished to-day, was and is a bagatelle compared with the taxes which people voluntarily impose on themselves every year in this land. The Turk or the Chinaman in his native country pays with difficulty \$2 or \$3 a year to his government, while in Coos county alone the average of taxes—national, State and municipal—will be upwards of \$50.

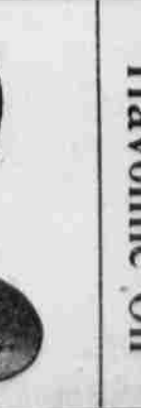
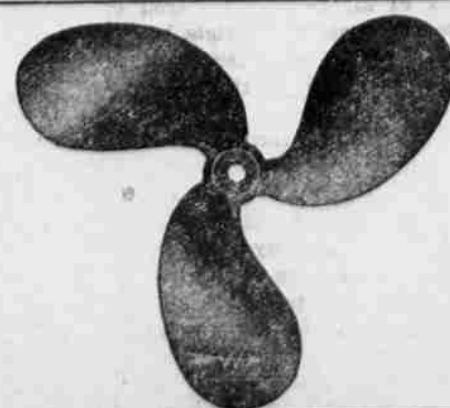
