

## LIGHT POSTS ARE COMING

Will Be Installed in Different  
Parts of the Business  
Section.

The new curb electric light posts which are to be put up in parts of the business section of Marshfield, will arrive on the next trip of the Breakwater and will be installed by the Coos Bay Gas and Electric Company. There will be twenty-one posts in this shipment. Two posts will be put up at the Chandler Hotel. In front of the new Chandler building there will be a line of seven posts extending along the new building and the First Trust and Savings Company and around the corner up to The Times office. Another line of posts will begin in front of the Flanagan and Bennett Bank, beginning at the post-office and extending around the corner and on Market avenue to the Perry, Montgomery and Company store. On the opposite side of the street, in front of the Coos building and down past the Lockhart drug store to the water front will be another line of posts.

Manager Jennings of the electric light company says that he expects many more of the property owners will put in the posts later on and rather expects that they will be extended over most of the business section.

### A FARMER'S ARGUMENT.

"I believe we should build up our own communities and enable our home merchants to give us a good market for our products by standing by them. We can buy all that we need and as cheaply by doing business at home, and thus make a better market for our products.

"How can we expect the town stores to thrive and grow if we as farmers refuse to trade with them, but send our money to some distant city which does not interest us or help us in the least?

"Is it not an object for us to build up our market town and make markets for our products? Does it not add to the value of our land to be able to point to some thriving nearby town with a ready market, schools and church advantages? Is not land so situated worth more than if it is isolated and distant from everything and everybody?

"By standing by our home merchants we are standing by each other, and by standing by each other we'll thrive and prosper together.

"Is it to our interest to build up great houses in distant cities? I make the broad assertion that while some things on the surface may seem cheaper than the prices of the home merchant, after we have scrimped ourselves to get the cash and paid freight and other charges, and paid for things we do not need because they seem cheap, we are actually out of pocket; we are simply gulled by cornucopians.

"If we keep depressing and destroying the home merchants, we will find after a lifetime that our farms are in an isolated region and have not increased in value as they would have if we had made a market at our very door.

"I know farmers who are always in debt to the local merchants, while their cash has gone to the railroad for freight bills and to the catalogue houses for articles which do not rank as either luxuries or necessities, but simply as legpullers to gull the unsophisticated.

"How would you appreciate selling your stock and products on credit and the purchaser using his money to buy similar articles in a distant market for cash?

"Unless we stand together and refuse to build up and develop this cornucopia which preys upon us, we do not deserve to have thriving towns for markets nor the advantages which always come from being surrounded by a business community."

### Why Buy at Home?

"Because: You examine your purchase and are assured of satisfaction before investing your money.

"Because: Your home merchant is always ready and willing to make right any error or any defective article purchased of him.

"Because: When you are sick or for any reason it is necessary for you to ask for credit, you can go to the local merchant. Could you ask it of a mail order house?

"Because: If a merchant is willing to extend you credit you should give him the benefit of your cash trade.

"Because: Your home merchant pays local taxes and exerts every effort to build and better your market, thus increasing the value of both city and country property.

"Because: The mail order merchant does not lighten your tax or in any way help the value of your property.

"Because: The mail order merchant does nothing for the benefit of markets or real estate values.

"Because: The best citizens in your community patronize home industry. Why not be one of the best citizens?

"Because: If you will give your home merchant an opportunity to compete, by bringing your order to him in the quantities you buy out of town, he will demonstrate that, quality considered, he will save you money."

## CITIES PAYING HIGH INTEREST

highest average net rates were: San Francisco, 4.30 per cent; and New York City, 4.19 per cent. Cities of from 100,000 to 300,000 population with the highest net rates were: Los Angeles, 4.49 per cent; Memphis, 4.34 per cent; and Jersey City and Omaha, 4.27 per cent. Cities of under 100,000 population which had to pay the highest rates for the use of money were: Little Rock, 5.29 per cent; Knoxville, 5.04 per cent; Mobile, 5.02 per cent; San Antonio, Birmingham and Springfield, Ill., 5 per cent; Bay City, 4.96 per cent; and Wichita, 4.71 per cent.

### Why Credit Terms Differ.

It is seen that Detroit, Indianapolis and most of the Massachusetts cities can borrow money on extremely favorable terms, while most of the Southern cities, New York City, and others have to pay materially higher rates. The length of time that bonds have to run has some effect upon the rates of interest that cities have to pay for the use of money.

Among other factors that determine that rate may be mentioned a small net debt. Detroit had the smallest per capita net debt of any city of over 300,000 inhabitants and Indianapolis had the smallest of cities of from 100,000 to 300,000 population. Each of these cities sold their bonds on the most favorable terms of any cities of their respective groups.

The table also shows the net rate of interest that cities pay upon their long-term bonds sold to their sinking and other city funds. New York City sold to its funds during the year more than \$17,000,000 bonds, on which it will pay a net interest rate of 3.01 per cent until maturity, this rate comparing with a net rate of 4.19 per cent paid to the public. Baltimore also borrowed from its funds at a net interest rate of 3.65 per cent compared with a rate of 3.94 per cent paid to the public. The net rates paid city funds in the cities of Ohio and Massachusetts were considerably higher than those paid to the public.

The cities with the largest per capita payments of interest on city debt are: Boston, \$6.67; New York City, \$6.36; Pueblo, \$5.31; Montgomery, \$4.97; and Cincinnati, \$4.76.
