ASSEMBLY IS A DISORGANIZER.

NOW THAT it is all over, and the State assembly nominees have been named, The Times fails to see where the assembly has made good in its claim to choose better candidates than the people. As regards at least one candidate, that of State Printer, the Assembly ignored a faithful public servant who has saved the State more than \$40,000 since his incumbency. The only reason for this action was that he would not endorse the Assembly plan.

The chief objection to the Assembly is that it seeks to divide the Republican party. Its chief animus is a spirit of "we are better than you," and the one thing which it professes is that it can choose men better qualified to serve the party and the people than the rank and file of Republicans acting under the established law of the State.

There is a deeper issue at stake in this Assembly proposition than the mere selection or suggestion of candidates—or the personal merits of the men so chosen—and that is the integrity of the Republican party. The party will always have its own corrective work to do. A popular institution such as the great dominant American party will always find within itself both men and measures that are unworthy, and the task of eliminating the bad and correcting the erroneous, will always be part of its duties. But the party can do this, and has always done it, without the necessity of any disruptive, reformative faction which sets itself up for that purpose as the Assembly leaders have done. The Assembly element in Coos county is made up of some very excellent citizens who are Republicans, but who have been led astray by the hue and cry of the Portland machine for party organization.

These men, excellent and worthy though they may be, are not representative of the rank and file of the Republican party in Coos county. The call which these men issued was written in Portland, and was so lacking in the elements that make for popular approval that it was ignored by the Republicans generally. Necessary as they may be, leaders alone do not constitute a party.

The Times, in common with the majority of the rank and file of the Republican party in Oregon in general and Coos county in particular, is opposing the Assembly and Assembly candidates because they make for discord and division in the party ranks and because its appeal is based upon the Pharisaical claim of superior virtues. There is no reason why the Republican party in Oregon should not get together and stand together in support of laws that are Republican measures and that are endorsed and approved by all except the machine manipulators in Portland and their misguided followers in other parts of the State.

SEVERAL WIN CASES.

Decision in Favor of Homesteaders Handed Down at Roseburg.

Several of the homesteaders in the Fall Creek country have won their cases as far as the land office at Roseburg is concerned. B. F. Jones, the register, has handed down a decision in several of the cases wherein the homesteaders are combating the Northern Pacific scrip. The register affirms the claims of John Schafer, John Herron, James Wynn, Huga Sneddon, Addison Cook, Tip Cordes, Earl Winner, Watt Short and Roy Moore. It is not yet known whether the cases will be appealed. There is more testimony to be taken in the cases of Alton Sengstacken and Tom Smith.

BIG CONTRACT IS AWARDED

Atlas Portland Cement Company Will Furnish Material For Canal.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, July 29.—The Government has contracted with the Atlas Portland Cement Company with a capitalization of \$12,500,000, is that it has been decided to suspend dividends on common stock for the present. The company has been paying eight per cent on common stock and has obtained a contract with the Government aggregating many millions of dollars to furnish cement for the Panama Canal.

The announcement states that owing to the extraordinary expenditures for increase in capacity of production it is to the best interests of the stockholders to suspend dividends instead of finance expenditures in a market where conditions unfavorable to investment prevail.
