Stage Passengers. — C. D. Minor and A. J. Mills were the only passengers on the Roseburg stage out of Marshfield this morning.

Plant Due To-Morrow. — The steamer M. F. Plant sailed from San Francisco at 6 o'clock last night and is due in Coos Bay to-morrow morning.

Parents Here. — Judge and Mrs. John W. Kreitzer of Dayton, Ohio, arrived in the city to-day and will visit for a month with their son, Dorsey Kreitzer.

In Albany Hospital. — Miss Elizabeth Gamble, who graduated as a nurse from Mercy Hospital at North Bend last June, has taken up nursing in St. Mary's Hospital in Albany.

Buy Land. — J. H. Bridges has bought thirty-six acres of land on Catching Inlet, about six miles from the city. It is nearly all bottom land and is a part of the Williams ranch. He will improve the place.

Engage Miss Wickman. — The directors of School District No. 18, at Flagstaff, have engaged Miss Annie Wickman, of Empire, to again teach the school during the coming term. Miss Wickman has had that school for several years.

Hunters Leave To-Morrow. — A party of hunters will leave to-morrow for the Tioga country, where they will hunt deer. The party will be composed of Ralph Matson, Ben Chandler, Hank Wells, Jim Boone and Mr. Huston of Portland.

Fruit Packing School. — The fruit growers' association of Douglas county has established a fruit packing school. The fruit growers are given instruction in packing fruit free of charge, so that they are better able to handle their crops for the market.

Returned From Beach. — The party of campers who went to the beach with Claude Nasburg and I. R. Tower in their autos have returned. They camped at Sunset Bay. With the bridge over South Slough finished, they found that it requires just about an hour to make the trip from the city to Sunset Bay. Formerly, with

a vehicle and crossing on the ferry it was half a day's work to reach there. The bridge and auto make a combination which brings the attractive resort within easy reach of the city.

Launch Arrives. — The Kittle, a gasoline launch for W. S. Chandler, arrived to-day from Portland on the Breakwater. It is a high power launch, which will hold quite a number of persons and has a canopy top. It is a pleasure launch to be used on the river.

Sisters Visit Here. — Sister Ursula and Sister Mary of St. Mary's Academy of Portland, arrived to-day on the steamer Breakwater. They will visit for a week at Mercy Hospital in North Bend. Capt. Whereat is the father of Sister Ursula and she is here to see her father.

Pushing Sewer Work. — Hugh McLain is pushing the work on the West Marshfield sewer. The pipe is being laid and the work will be done in about three weeks. When the sewer is completed, Mr. McLain will take up the planking work on Fifth and Eleventh streets.

No Service at Gardiner. — Rev. Father Curley expected to go to Gardiner to hold services Sunday, but on account of other matters which will keep him at home he will be unable to make the trip this Sunday. He will postpone his visit to Gardiner until later on.

Drain Auto Line. — A. N. Denny, who has established an auto line between Drain and Scottsburg, was a Marshfield visitor yesterday. He takes passengers through to make connections without the over-night delay. The new auto connects with all Southern Pacific trains.

Sailed From Bandon. — The steamer Fife, with a cargo of lumber for the George W. Moore Lumber Company and passengers for San Francisco, sailed from Bandon to-day. The Newport sailed from Bandon for Port Orford, where she will land a cargo of cans for the canning factory.

Back From Portland. — J. W. Bennett, Tom Bennett and Jack Meehan arrived home in Mr. Bennett's auto last night. They had been in Portland and the auto was run down from that city. Mr. Bennett went as far as Roseburg on the train and joined the auto party across the mountains.

Eastside Wedding. — At the residence of the groom, in Eastside, on Tuesday evening, occurred the marriage of William Leaton and Mrs. Elma C. Olds, both of Coos county. Mrs. Fred R. Miller and Ed. Clements were attendants. At the conclusion of the ceremony, a pleasant wedding supper was served to a number of invited guests.

Dig Up Skeleton. — Workmen grading the county road near South Slough dug up the remains of a dead Indian. With the bones, was an old rifle which fell to pieces when taken up. The rifle butt was taken to the North Bend high school. It is not unusual to dig up the bones of Indians in the lower bay country. It is thought that the bones were those of one buried probably fifty years ago.

KILLS BIG GRAY EAGLE

W. M. McMullen Brings Down
the Bird With a Spruce
Knot.

W. M. McMullen killed a fine gray eagle, which he brought to the city this morning to be mounted. The bird is quite a rare one to be killed and this specimen is particularly large. Mr. McMullen has not measured it yet, but it is so large that he cannot spread the wings by stretching out both arms.

The manner in which the bird was killed was quite remarkable. Mr. McMullen was near the road in the South Slough neighborhood. He saw the eagle fly from an alder bush, and as it was but a short distance away from him he threw a spruce knot at the bird. It was a good throw and the knot struck the bird and brought it down.
