BOTH WINGS OF PARTY MUST FLOP TOGETHER.

"I WANT to see regular and progressive Republicans. I want to see party men and independents. I want to see Democrats as well as Republicans."

Whose is this utterance?

Theodore Roosevelt's, of course. No other citizen of this country is in a position to see politicians of every party. No other private citizen is so wanted to be seen by partisans of every political opinion.

Mr. Roosevelt has stated exactly what every man who has faith in the integrity of human nature knew he would say. He has taken sides neither with the regular Republican as such, nor with the progressive Republican as such, but with both as Republicans.

Mr. Roosevelt is a Republican first, but a regular and progressive Republican next. He knows that regularity and progressiveness are the balance and the mainspring of the party.

Progressiveness is the saving salt to preserve the Republican party from dry rot or worse, corruption. Every honest Republican in Oregon knows what the conditions were before the primary law was enacted—conditions of which the people justly complained. If the direct primary had not injected the anti-toxin of progress the party would not have been able to effect the great remedial legislation which it has achieved.

The true glory of Republicanism has always been found in its progressiveness and its repeated renewals of its own best life. The election and reelection of Lincoln; the granger movement and the housecleaning accomplished by Hayes that saved the party in 1880; the reformatory protest of 1884 miscalled mugwumpism; the election of Mr. Roosevelt in 1904 and the progressive Republicanism of the last five years—all these are but manifestations of one and the same moral impulse, keeping the party up to the level of the people and pulling its professional politicians forward.

The party has always had men among its leaders who represented low ideals and reactionary tendencies. If there was a Lincoln, there also was a Ben Butler the turncoat. If there was a Hayes, who initiated reconciliation with the South, there was a Conkling who never put a great law on the federal statute book. If there is a Roosevelt whose political career began as a mugwump and reformer, there are Aldriches and Cannons who would hold the party to positions that the people long ago progressed beyond.

When Republicanism has expressed such ideals of the people as the granger movement, or as the political progressiveness of the present, it has commanded the votes of the vast majority. When it has expressed the ideas of politicians, it either has gone down in defeat or has at best barely won the victory. It is because the Assembly is opposed to the popular ideals of progressive Republicans that they refuse to recognize it. The leaders should not attempt to force it on the party. They should recognize the need of harmony and that both wings of the party must beat together with equal stroke if we would win.

LIBRARY NOTES.

Another small consignment of new books for the public library arrived on the Breakwater Friday. They will be ready for circulation the latter part of this week.

One of the greatest things parents can do to encourage their children to read the right sort of books is to read with them and discuss the books with them. Boys and girls are influenced by the books they read as well as by the friends with whom they associate, and both should be carefully chosen. It is regrettable to find that many children of ten and eleven have already acquired unwholesome tastes in reading. A librarian alone cannot correct this—the parents must show some interest in what their children are reading.

It is the custom in many libraries throughout the country to have at stated times, a reading and story hour for children, when selections from the best literature are read or told to the children, sometimes accompanied by display of pictures from great artists, or talks on different subjects. Our library is thinking of taking up this work, but before a decision is made, the librarian would like to have an expression of opinion on the subject from parents.

YACHT FOR GOSPEL WORK.

Pastor Russell to Work Among Sailors in the Port.
(From the New York American, June 4, 1910.)

Pastor Russell, president of the Peoples Pulpit Association, was yesterday presented, for Christian mission work, the fully equipped and seaworthy Angel, a naphtha and sailing yacht. She is about 125 feet over all, has seating capacity in dining saloon for seventy persons and is prepared for main deck meetings in fair weather.

As indicated by Pastor Russell in his acceptance of the vessel, unique work will be undertaken in New York harbor. It is said the meetings on board the Angel will be advertised from day to day, stating her moorings as well as the language of the speaker. Thus all who desire may keep in touch with this witness of the "gospel of glad tidings to all nations."

"Fortunately, my friends, this gift is not wholly a surprise to me," said Pastor Russell in accepting it. "I had intimations and was in touch with some of you respecting the Angel. Nevertheless I am at a loss for fitting words wherewith to express my appreciation of your loving zeal in following a suggestion I dropped respecting the soul needs of the sailors of all nationalities visiting this great port. 'Let me, then, briefly say I accept your gift, not in my own name, but in the name of the Peoples Pulpit Association—as its trustee, if you please. May the Angel always and in every language sound forth the praises of the God of all grace!'"
