### MANY FOR COOS BAY.

Steamer Reservations Show a Rather Heavy Travel.

Regarding travel to Coos Bay the Oregonian says:

Reservations made for the next three voyages of the steamer Breakwater, which sails this morning for Coos Bay, are sufficiently heavy to insure for her full passenger lists, and there are said to be no indications of a diminishment of the travel.

"There are few tourists visiting Coos Bay points this season, a large percentage of the travel being of the regular character," said Captain Macgenn, of the Breakwater, yesterday. 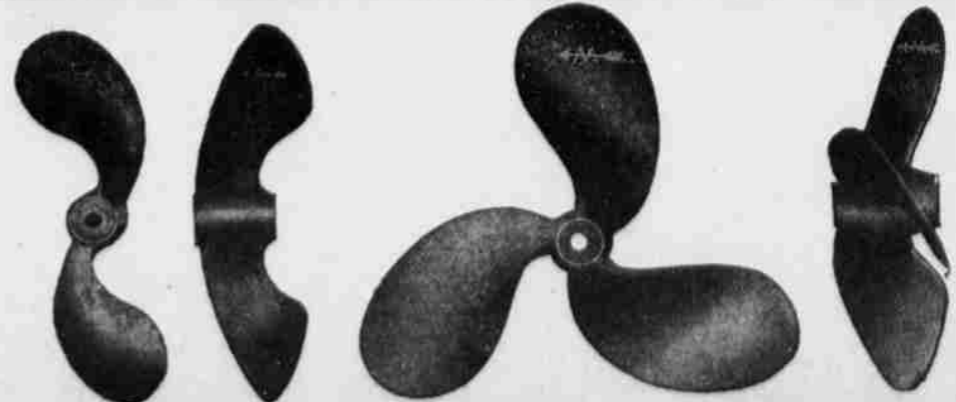
