There is an opportunity for fishermen to make good money right now working in the salmon fisheries on the Rogue River. The Gold Beach Globe says:

The Hume boys are scouring the country for help, to work in the canneries and on the seine. \$2.50 per day is offered and 40 cents per hour for overtime. Men that are willing to work can earn four or five dollars per day, by working overtime.

DEPARTMENT REFUSES.

Bandon People Still Insist Upon Better Mail Service.

BANDON, Ore., August 6.—E. E. Oakes, president of the Bandon Commercial Club, has received from Senator Bourne a letter regarding the petitions of the Bandon people for a better mail service. Senator Bourne states that the department has investigated and finds that Bandon has a seven-day service and that there is a six-day service between Bandon and Langlois, and that the expense of any further service is not warranted. Bandon people are contending that they have neither a seven-day service from Coquille nor a six-day service with Langlois and that they are entitled to both. They hold that the department is laboring under a false impression of what service is now given.

Facts of Interest Taken From the Coquille Valley Sentinel.

WILL MOVE TRACKS.

Coquille Council Is Settling the Railroad Question.

The city council of Coquille expects to soon settle the matter of moving the railroad tracks in that city. The council as a convention of the whole has considered the question. Regarding the meeting of the committee the Coquille Valley Sentinel says:

The moving of the railroad tracks will entail the purchase by the city of the water front from the present city property to Ferry street and also the purchase of the wedge-shaped lot lying just west of the laundry property at an expense of \$6,500 and by this purchase the city will become the owner of all the valuable water front along the river at a cost far below what the same could be purchased by private interests. It will also entail upon the part of the city the changing of the present city wharves to conform with the new conditions, but these are changes which are necessary in any event and therefore are only hastened by the moving of the tracks.

Nothing final or of an absolutely definite nature could be done by the committee and all their actions will have to be ratified by the council, but the matter as it now stands is more promising than ever before.

RUN OF FISH GOOD.

Big Catch of Salmon Reported at Rogue River.

The Gold Beach Globe says: There is a better run of fish in the river now than has been for several years. The upper seine, under the able management of Calvin Woodruff, caught more than fifteen hundred Saturday evening.
