THE COQUILLE DISASTER.

COQUILLE and her individual citizens who suffered such a serious and stinging loss in the disaster of last Friday night will receive the sincere sympathy of all Coos county. Following so quickly another catastrophe of similar evil effect it becomes doubly disastrous.

The destruction of the Johnson Mill and the Morse electric light plant involves not only large immediate financial sacrifice but serious commercial inconvenience for some time to come. It was a blow to Coos Bay as well as to its own interested people, for with the extended business ramifications of the Johnson Mill Company, this city was an important factor, the lumber shipments being made through this port. It also reduces the important and active industries of this section by one, and we cannot spare any of them, no matter its scope or capital. They all stand for the business life of the community and section and have their place and intrinsic value.

The Times, in common with other people hereabout, deeply regrets the loss, private and public, and hopes at an early day the plant and business will be restored to even greater activity and business success than it has known in the past.

COOS BAY ABROAD.

Several forces of men are engaged in laying the waterworks pipe with the prospect that the new system will be ready for use within a few weeks. The reservoir has been completely repaired and there is every prospect that we will have a fine and adequate service when the work is done.

Advertisements have been posted asking for bids on a new mail route between Myrtle Point and Coquille, which will give a seven-day service to Coquille and the lower river. It will be practically restoring the same conditions that prevailed before all the mail was changed to one route, except that Myrtle Point will continue as the mail terminal.

E. N. Smith came up from Bandon Wednesday and is giving his attention to the placing of a new roof on the brick building occupied by Brown Brothers. Mr. Smith has become one of the live wires in Bandon's development and is just closing out the remaining lots in an addition to the city recently opened by him. He expects to be further identified with Bandon's development in the future, but will leave this month for his winter home at Riverside, Calif., driving through.
