Ranch Not Sold.—G. H. Myers of Coos River was in Marshfield to-day on business. He reports that the rumor of the sale of his ranch to Mr. Landrith for \$24,000 was erroneous. He has refused an offer of \$26,000 for the place.

Went Hunting.—R. O. Graves, John Kronholm and Charles Hickox went hunting Sunday. They were in the Pony Slough country, but did not have any success in finding deer as there has been a fire in that district and the fire has scared away all the game.

In New York.—Elijah Smith, of the Southern Oregon Company, who has been expected on the Bay for the last few weeks is now in New York. The Times yesterday received a bundle of New York papers from him, but there was no intimation of his return here to resume activities.

Deal Falls Through.—The deal for the purchase of the R. D. Hume estate by a Portland syndicate has fallen through, it is understood here. The syndicate was given an option on the payment of a small amount and would have gone through with the deal, the promoters assert, had it not been for the initiative legislation proposed by Medford people which prohibits fishing in Rogue River except by hook and line. If this law is enacted at the November election, it will paralyze the principal industry in Curry county and cut off the principal revenue now gained by the estate.

GOOD RUN AT ROGUE RIVER

Capt. Wirth Comes Up With Launch Fish and Cargo of Salmon.

The launch Fish, which brought up a cargo of salmon for the Union Fisheries Company, sails again this afternoon for Rogue River. The Fish is in charge of Capt. O. A. Wirth and Engineer Tom Golden. Capt. Wirth says he brought up about four tons of salmon and that the fishing is good. It is to be a big year and some fine salmon are captured, those shipped averaging in weight about twenty-five pounds. The Fish will take back a load of ice as the salmon can be kept longer without such frequent shipping to this point.

Capt. Wirth says that in spite of the injunction brought by Herbert Hume, the Union Fisheries is still catching salmon. The injunction prevented the company from fishing on the Hume estate, but there is an island at the mouth of the river which the company has located on.

The island is practically on the bar and was formed last winter, and the company claims that it cannot be driven from this point and is making that place headquarters and continuing the fishing. The injunction suit is to be decided in the courts. The season closes August 15th and opens again September 5th.

The run of salmon is also expected to be large in Coos Bay this year. Four years ago a large number of fry were liberated and as the salmon come back matured every four years it is expected that the run here will be large. The fish are beginning to come in now.
