

GOING AFTER THE WIRELESS

Seven Officers of United Company Indicted by Federal Grand Jury.

NEW YORK, August 8.—Seven officers of the United Wireless Telegraph Company, which has "planted" stock in nearly every gullible community in the United States, were indicted on two counts by the Federal Grand Jury. Secret service men charge that the wireless grafters used the United States mails to sell worthless stock and to induce investors to buy paper at a price many hundreds of per cent higher than the value as an ordinary commodity.

One of the indicted men bears the euphonious and historically suggestive name of "Christopher Columbus" Wilson, the others are Samuel Bogar, W. W. Tompkins, George H. Parker, C. C. Gallbraith, W. A. Bilbott and Francis Butler.

All except Bogar were arraigned before Judge Hough in the United States district court and pleaded not guilty.

The company has outstanding \$20,000,000 in preferred and common stock, much of which has been sold in western cities, including Portland, Or., San Francisco, Cal., Los Angeles, Cal., and Seattle, Wash.

For several years these men have been selling "wireless" stock and have maintained stations in cities, and these stations seldom if ever got any information and have not made enough money other than by stock selling, to purchase first class telegraph sounders. The graft has been so pronounced and so far-reaching that the government has taken a hand in its suppression.

OLD SETTLER DIES.

Mrs. Anna Bender of Myrtle Point Has Passed Away.

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., August 8.—Mrs. Anna Bender, mother of the late Edward Bender, who died at the home of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. E. Bender, in this city, on Tuesday, August 2d, was an old Coos county settler. She was aged 90 years, 9 months and 18 days. The funeral was held from the Brethren Church at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and was conducted by Rev. Thomas Barklow, interment being in the Myrtle Point Cemetery, beside the grave of her son. She is survived by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. E. Bender and three grandsons, A. H. Bender, E. E. Bender and C. L. Bender, all of this city, and also has four nieces in California, besides many friends here to mourn her loss. Her maiden name was Anna, daughter of Herman Trust, and she was born at Frankenburg, Curb Hesse, Germany, on October 15, 1819, and came to the United States about 1831; came to California in 1859, returning to Baltimore for some years and in 1883 came to Oregon to make her home with her only son at Myrtle Point. She was known as a very kind and upright woman and had lived a most honorable life. She was a member of the German Lutheran Church.

BOUGHT LARGE TRACTS.

R. C. Dement Will Subdivide Five Hundred Acres.

R. C. Dement, who passed through Marshfield on his way home from Portland, bought a large piece of real estate while in the northern part of the State. During his trip he bought a tract of 500 acres of land within a mile and a quarter of Hubbard and 32 miles from Portland. This tract, which is yet in the rough and covered with wood and timber, is all tillable and watered with some of the finest creeks and springs in the State. He proposes to cut up into small tracts and place on the market in amounts to suit purchasers. He expects to return soon and oversee the survey and division of the tract. Mr. Dement states that he has purchased the tract at a price that permits him to place it on the market at prices lower than land of the same character can be sold for here.

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H. W. SCOTT PASSES AWAY

in the movement for the Lewis and Clarke Exposition at Portland in 1900. Mr. Scott was elected on the first board of directors of the exposition corporation and was the vice-president, and later the president, of the organization.

In 1856 Mr. Scott was married to Miss Elizabeth Nicklin, who died in 1875, leaving two children. In 1877 he was married to Miss Margaret McChesney of Philadelphia. Three children were born by the second wife.

In his editorial policy, Mr. Scott during the time of the Civil War, when there was quite a strong Southern sentiment in Oregon, stood as a strong friend of the Union. Probably the greatest political fight that Mr. Scott ever made was his stand for sound money in the campaign of 1896, when his fight was rewarded by Oregon being the only States west of the Rocky Mountains that gave its full electoral vote to McKinley. Mr. Scott was always prominent in politics as a Republican. After President Taft was seated Mr. Scott was offered the position of United States minister to Mexico, but he did not accept the offer.

As a newspaper man he was a veteran and a pioneer and was known not only widely on the Pacific Coast but as an editor he had gained national repute.

HAD ROUGH TRIP.

Launch Skidoo Came Near Being Swamped at Sea.

The launch Skidoo, which has returned from Rogue River, had a rough trip of it going down from Coos Bay the last time. Tom Smith, who went down with the boat says that he thought it was all over. Capt. Ellery and wife and child, Tom Smith and Will Hunter were aboard. The sea was rough and the waves dashed over the little boat and filled it with water and stopped the engines. The fish was also making the trip and finally towed the Skidoo and the water was bailed out. Mrs. Ellery and the child were put aboard the Fish. Had the little boat been alone she would probably have been lost.

BOAT SYSTEM CHEAPER.

Ten Mile Creamery Finds It Costs Less Than Running Wagons.

The current number of Watson's Western Creamery, published at San Francisco, contains a picture and writeup of the cream boat used at Ten Mile lakes. The boat is operated by Green & Foster of San Francisco, the firm owning the Lakeside Creamery at Ten Mile and the Bandon Creamery as well. The boat cost \$800 and carries about fifty cans of cream every day, visiting the ranchers on the lakes who are patrons of the creamery. The company estimates that the cost of gathering the cream is about half a cent per pound of butterfat, which is about one-third of the cost of the wagon system of collecting cream.

TWO NEW MEN ABOARD.

Levi Snyder Is Second Mate and a New Purser Is Appointed.

The steamer Newport has two new men aboard. Harry Reynolds, who resigned as purser, went on the steamer Redondo, and W. M. Dutton has been named as purser of the Newport. Levi Snyder, who is well known here, and who was formerly captain of the Arago which was

wrecked, has been made second mate on the Newport. Regarding his appointment the Oregonian of August 5th says:

Following a loss of twenty-four hours' time, because Second Mate Valbusch secured another berth on the steamer Golden Gate, the steamer Newport sailed last night, Captain Parsons having signed Captain Levi Snyder to fill the vacancy. Charges filed against Valbusch will be set for hearing when the latter returns from Tillamook.
