REPRESENTATIVE SENT.

Coquille River Man Visits Engineers' Office at Portland.

A. Schow represented the people of the Coquille Valley at the government engineers' office at Portland. He went there to see about the dredge Oregon being brought to the Coquille River to do the dredging for which the government has appropriated money. The Portland Journal says that the work in the Coquille River will consist of dredging the channel and removing snags and shoals, and the amount of money appropriated by the government for the work is \$56,000. It is stated that the engineer in charge says that there is work for the dredge Oregon in Coos Bay after she is done in Gray's Harbor and that it is hard to tell just where the dredge will be at any particular time.

HEISNER EXPLAINS CASE.
