# COLUMBIA IS COMING SOON

### Will Arrive in Few Days to Resume Service As Bar Tug.

The tug Columbia, owned by the Simpson Lumber Company, is expected here within a few days. She has been repaired and will be used for towing over the Coos Bay bar. Capt. Bendorgard, formerly of the steam schooner Redondo, will bring the Columbia up from San Francisco, but it is not yet known whether he or some other officer will be master of the tug after she arrives.

There are no vessels at North Bend, but four of the Simpson Lumber Company fleet are expected any time. They are the Advent, the Omega, the Echo and the Repeat, all of which have sailed from California ports.

# ADDRESS WILL BE GOOD ONE

### Bishop Scadding's Talk Here Saturday Evening to Be Rare Treat.

Usually people "fight shy" of going to hear a missionary sermon; and yet a large number of people in Bandon paid admission to hear Bishop Scadding, Episcopal Bishop of Oregon, speak for an hour in the Bijou Theatre last night on the missionary work of his church. The lecture which was profusely illustrated with views from the camera of the bishop, was a sketch of the missionary work in the Middle West and Oregon, and a plea for the missions of the great Western State, which are without a rector—called by Bishop Scadding the "Silent Churches of Oregon."

Bishop Scadding's address was practically a report of the work accomplished, giving a statement of the good that has been done in the past and what is left to be done in the future. He started with the missionary work in the Middle West and the labors of the missionaries among the Indians of the plains. These Christianized people, Bishop Scadding said, might be able to teach their white brethren many lessons in the art of giving for the support of the church, and he cited one instance when, at a meeting of the Indian Women's Auxiliary, held on the plains of South Dakota, 600 women gave an offering of \$2,247.

**Told of Western Missions.**  
Passing from there, he took his listeners through Utah and out of Dakota into Oregon, where, with the aid of a fast train, he traveled through his see, giving glimpses of the missions, most of which have their churches, rectories and "prophet house" fitted up to accommodate missionaries on their tours, right up to Portland and down the coast of the Pacific ocean.

The coast missions are at present twelve in number. There are forty-two parishes and missions and only eighteen clergymen. In the past clergy have traveled east for the purpose of raising funds for the building of the churches, and though they are free from debt, there are no clergymen to carry on the work and they remain silent symbols of the work to be accomplished.

The Bishop is an enthusiastic believer in the future of Coos Bay and shows many well colored pictures of its attractive scenery. This lecture will be given in Marshfield on Saturday evening, August 13th.

# RECEIPTS ON THE INCREASE

### Postoffice Business Is Greater This Year Than in 1909.

The receipts at the local postoffice for the month of July showed an increase over the preceding month. The total receipts for July were \$1,290.16. December is always a big month on account of the Christmas business. During the spring of the year the postoffice business is generally heavier than later on in the summer. The total receipts for each month of the year so far as reported by Postmaster Curtis are as follows: January .....\$1,524.89 February ..... 1,011.23 March ..... 1,277.67 April ..... 1,251.21 May ..... 804.75 June ..... 932.43 July ..... 1,290.16 The total for the year so far is quite an increase over the total for the same months of 1909. In short, the business of the postoffice at Marshfield is constantly on the increase.

### MAKES STATEMENT.

#### George F. Averill Tells Plans of Electric Line.

In a Roseburg newspaper George F. Averill, president of the Coos Bay Traction Corporation makes a statement regarding the plan of the company. He states that the preliminary survey has been made from Coos Bay to Roseburg, but that it is yet to be decided how the route shall enter and go through Roseburg. He states that if the Roseburg people will take a reasonable amount of the bonds that the railroad will build on any route in the city that seems best to the people of Roseburg and that the company will begin work within thirty days if some agreement can be reached.
