(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, August 12.—"Barring accidents, Mayor Gaynor's recovery is practically assured." This statement was made this afternoon by the Mayor's son, Rufus Gaynor, who said he had the physicians' assurance to that effect.

The physicians this morning were not willing to supplement the bulletin with even the information of the patient's condition, evidently assuming that the reassuring tenor of official announcement was all that was necessary to quiet all fears that had found expression late yesterday and last night.

MAJOR KINNEY SENDS WORD

Wires Times That He Will Not Sell His Electric Franchises.

Major L. D. Kinney has sent a telegram to The Times regarding his affairs. The following is the message, which explains itself:

"PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12. "Editor Coos Bay Times, Marshfield Oregon: "I see by the Harbor, Hollister says they will not pay Rapid Transit obligations but will buy the franchise. No they will not. I did not get those franchises to peddle. If the option is not taken up they may die a natural death. I will pay the funeral expenses of my own dead, and pick out my own pallbearers. The editor of the Harbor may be called upon to prove his uncalculated slur on my character. When he says the school district paid for that site he is a liar and the truth is not in him. What little they paid out to clear the title they hold other security for. What holds Coos Bay development back most is the unjust treatment of their best workers. They abuse Elijah Smith for what he does not do, and myself for what I try to do at my own expense. I am now working faithfully and earnestly for Coos Bay. Can I not have one encouraging word. I give fair warning—now I will prosecute the slanderers of my name. Quit your infamous conduct toward me or get ready to stand the consequences. "L. D. KINNEY."

PRISONER IS SAFE IN JAIL

Joseph Wendling Finally Arrives at Louisville to Face Murder Charge.

(By Associated Press.) LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 12.—Joseph Wendling, wanted here in connection with the Alma Kellner murder, was placed in the city hall here this morning after a remarkable chase across the continent and an almost equally remarkable return. Wendling toughed Kentucky soil shortly after 8 o'clock this morning for the first time in many months. He and Detective Carney took the train at Evansville about 3 o'clock. When the train arrived a large sized but orderly crowd was kept in bounds by plenty of police, and when Wendling was hurried from the car to an auto there was no demonstration. It has not yet been announced when Wendling will be presented in the police court. In all probability there will be one or two continuances granted and he will be held to answer to the criminal court. He already has been indicted on a charge of murder.

ROOSEVELT MAY ACT.

Has Been Asked to Be Chairman of State Convention.

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, August 12.—It is reported to-day that at the suggestion of Lloyd C. Griscom, chairman of the Republican Central Committee, Col. Roosevelt had taken under advisement the proposal that he act as temporary chairman of the New York Republican State Convention, and it is said he is inclined to view the idea favorably.

HUNTERS GET TWELVE DEER

Three Marshfield Boys Return From Trip to Rogue River Country.

Iris Elrod, James Cowan and Frank Nelme got three, Elrod four and ry county, where they went on a hunting trip. They got twelve deer. Nelme got three, Elrod four and Cowan four. The boys said they could have gotten more game had they hunted more. They were gone several weeks. From Wedderburn they went up the Rogue River about eighteen miles and were in the wilds of the mountains. Two of the party went down overland and Cowan went in a gasoline boat on the ocean. The supplies were shipped in the boat and much of the supplies were spoiled because gasoline got on the provisions in the boat. This left the boys rather short of a variety of food and they got down to nothing but beans and pancake flour. When this ran out they started home.

DENIES THE REPORT.

French Newspaper Makes Comment Upon the Spanish Crisis.

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, August 12.—Les Nouvelles to-day says that it is authorized to deny the statement by the Madrid Epoque that Premier Brian had advised King Alphonso against the rupture with Rome. The paper further says the King told Brian that he did not propose to obey the injunctions of the Vatican, to tolerate the threats of the Vatican or to allow the Vatican to mix in Spanish politics. Les Nouvelles says that Brian did offer sage advice to the young monarch, warning His Majesty to proceed diplomatically and to avoid brusqueness.

WALLACE, IDAHO, THREATENED WITH DESTRUCTION BY FIRE

He created a sensation during a reception to Congressman Hamer at Wallace last night by stopping the orchestra while it was playing "Dixie," saying to musicians "This is a republican meeting and we want no such tunes here." The amazed musicians stopped immediately. After a moment of silence Mayor Hanson arose and closed the meeting.

WILL DREDGE COOS RIVER

Roy Rozell to Have Charge of Work Which Begins Soon.

Roy Rozell, formerly keeper of the government works on the lower bay, will have charge of the dredging on Coos River, which will be done at the expense of the government appropriation and which will begin soon. The small government dredge on Coos Bay will be used for the work and a crew of about seven men will operate it. There is some repair work to be done on the dredge and some of the tackle is expected on the next trip of the Breakwater. The work will begin as soon as the tackle is received and the machinery put in readiness.

EARTHQUAKE IS RECORDED

Instruments Show Shock Which Is Thought to Be in Central America.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—Seismograph at the weather bureau recorded earthquake tremors yesterday. It is estimated the center of disturbance is about 2100 miles from Washington, probably in Central America or off the southern coast of Mexico.

AT CLEVELAND.

(By Associated Press.) CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 12.—The seismograph at St. Ignatia College today showed an earthquake 2000 miles distant from Cleveland which occurred yesterday. The movement was from east to west.

MAKES NEW RECORD.

(By Associated Press.) LANARK, Scotland, Aug. 12.—It was officially announced today that J. Armstrong Drexel, the American aviator, last night attained the world's altitude record by rising 6,750 feet.

Heavy Smoke Envelopes City and Change of Wind Means Ruin.

MANY CITIZENS ARE FLEEING FROM PLACE.

Impossible to Estimate Damage Done in Mining Camps of the Locality.

(By Associated Press.) SPOKANE, Wash., August 12.—Blazing embers swept by the wind from the burning forests are falling in Wallace, Idaho, this morning. Dense smoke buries the town, making it impossible to see objects 200 yards away. Hundreds of families are packing up their possessions and will flee to Spokane and other towns. Should the wind increase it is believed nothing can save the town. Forest fires, raging in the Placer Creek district, five miles from Wallace, have destroyed the buildings owned by Wentworth Clothing Company, and the Vienne, Arctic, Smuggler and Gold Star Mining Companies. On account of the dense smoke, it is impossible to get into the camps and estimate the damages. The Multan, Murray and other camps are also in danger. At Multan, the firemen and citizens are keeping the roofs soaked to catch the sparks. The timber on Kellogg Peak, close to Wardner, is blazing, but the town is believed to be safe.

FIRE MORE SERIOUS.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, August 11.—The fire in the Flathead reservation is more serious to-day and more troops are being ordered to the scene.

FIRE ALARM WAKES MANY

Bid Crowd Out Early This Morning When Small Shed Burns.

A fire alarm at 1.30 o'clock this morning aroused the people near the business section. It was reported that the old stove mill was on fire. When the people started in that direction there were no flames to be seen and they turned back. It developed that a small building near the old mill was on fire and burned up before the flames spread any further.

The fire whistle blew for a long time and the fire bell was kept ringing to bring together the members of the department. Anyone who was within range was sure to be awakened and a large crowd collected on the streets. An auto ran down Front street and as there was no fire to be seen the department did not go out.

CAPTURES BANK ROBBER.

Citizens Chase Him Through Streets of Fond Du Lac.

(By Associated Press.) FOND DU LAC, Wis., August 12.—A. G. Crane, giving his home as Milwaukee, made a bold attempt to rob the Coles Savings Bank this afternoon. He was pursued by citizens through the streets, firing a revolver as he went. He was finally captured.
