## THE POLITICAL POT

Begins to Simmer and Bubble in County and State—Candidates Commencing to Get Busy in Old Coos.

Coos Bay will be honored with visits from several of the State candidates for office during the carnival. Jay Bowerman, the Assembly candidate for Governor, is to be here, and Col. E. Hofer of Salem, also a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor, has sent word that he will be here with some of his friends. B. E. Mulkey, candidate for Congress, has also written that he will visit Marshfield. Thomas Campbell, State Railroad Commissioner, has been in the city for several days.

Herbert Hume, who is out for the nomination for Joint Representative from Coos and Curry counties on the Republican ticket, is to have opposition. S. P. Pierce has recently announced his candidacy.

Several of the candidates on the county ticket put in the field by the Assembly will have opposition. A. N. Gould is out as the regular Republican for County Surveyor in opposition to the Assembly candidate, Ed. Rackleff is out for Representative from Coos county against Treadgold. Dr. Golden is the regular Republican candidate for Coroner in opposition to the Assembly candidate, Fred N. Perkins of Bandon was expected to be out for County Commissioner as the regular Republican candidate, but on account of an accident that befell him lately he may not be able to run. He fell from a wagon a few weeks ago and broke his hip and has been taken to a hospital at San Francisco for treatment. He may, however, be able to make the race. I. T. Weekly of Gravel Ford is being talked of by his friends as a good man to run for Commissioner.

The Democrats are also getting busy. R. A. Copple of Marshfield is talked of for Democratic candidate for Joint Representative. F. W. Stevens, the civil engineer, will be a candidate for County Surveyor. There is some talk of running Councilman Tom Coke on the Democratic ticket for County Commissioner.

### CHALLENGE TO HAWLEY.

**B. F. Mulkey Invites Congressman to Meet Him on Platform to Debate Political Issues.**

In announcing his candidacy for Congress on an anti-assembly, Statement No. 1 platform, B. F. Mulkey, of Jacksonville, challenges Congressman W. C. Hawley to meet him in joint discussion of political issues, such debates to be held in every county in the First Congressional District. Mulkey's announcement of his candidacy is as follows:

"I hereby announce myself a candidate for congress, subject to the will of the Republican voters of the First Congressional District of Oregon at the coming primary election. A number of letters from the Willamette valley, and the Umpqua, and the Coos Bay section urging me to run, as well as many personal solicitations by friends in Jackson and Josephine counties since the state assembly of July 21, this year, together with evident general demand for some candidate to represent the principles I hereafter announce impels me to this step.

"If nominated and elected to congress, I will not vote for Joseph Cannon for speaker of the house, and, to the end that legislative power may not be concentrated in the hands of a few men, I will vote to take away from the speaker the appointment of the rules committee and all other committees and return it to the house, whence it originated.

"I shall vote to give the Interstate commerce commission power to regulate railroad rates upon the basis of value of the physical property of the railroads and to give the commission power and authority to limit the issuance of stocks and bonds of railways to actual investment made.

"I will vote for a revision of the tariff with the interests of the mass of consumers constantly in the foreground, and shall insist that, on all trust manufactured articles, the revision be downward until the tariff schedule shall cover the difference in the actual cost of manufacture in the United States and foreign countries only, as was promised by the last national Republican platform.

"I shall vote for a constitutional amendment providing for direct election of United States senators and shall give my moral support to the Oregon plan, known as Statement Number One, until such time as an amendment to the Federal Constitu-

tion shall render it no longer necessary.

"That the issues raised in the foregoing statement may be developed and tested before the people, I respectfully and cordially invite the assembly nominee, Congressman W. C. Hawley, to a joint discussion of the same to be held in every county of the First Congressional district."

### BENSON TO HAVE OPPONENT.

**G. Wingate, of Astoria, a Former Coos Bay Man, Out For Secretary of State.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—G. Wingate, of Astoria, has entered the list against Frank W. Benson for the Republican nomination for Secretary of State. Mr. Wingate sent his declaration of intention to the Secretary of State's office last night, announcing himself as a direct primary candidate, pledging himself if nominated and elected to an economical administration and close personal attention to official duties.

Mr. Wingate is a man about 62 years of age and has been a resident of Oregon since 1872. He was born in Scotland and came to the United States in 1867. He went to California during the mining excitement there and moved to Coos Bay in 1872. He has long been a resident of Astoria, where he has followed his profession of civil and mining engineering and has, of late, been engaged in the real estate business extensively. Mr. Wingate was a member of the state board of equalization during 1896 and was one of the committee of 21 which secured the construction of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad into Astoria.

"I have never been anything but a Republican," said the candidate. "I was a Republican in the days when it took courage to be one. I was a sound money Republican when large numbers of the party were shifting the other way, and I have been a low tariff Republican in spite of the fact that many of my comrades have been high tariff men.

"I am a firm believer in the direct primary law and believe that it should be upheld and rigidly observed. I believe in the direct election of United States senators, and that the people of the state should guard well the advantages which they have gained by direct legislation. I have never been a candidate for office, having heretofore directed my energies to helping my friends secure recognition."

### SOCIALISTS NAME TICKET.

**Coquille Men Are Named For State Offices.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 10.—Demanding universal suffrage for all persons over 21 years old, the public ownership of all natural resources and public utilities, the organization and management of all industries by the workers themselves and the production of all necessities of life for use instead of for profit, and calling upon all workers of the state to organize under the banner of Socialism, the Socialist party of the state met in convention in Portland Monday night, and placed a ticket in the field for the coming election.
