#### INDIAN FIGHTER DIES.

John H. Deadmond Was a Pioneer of Southern Oregon.

John H. Deadmond, who died on August 4th, was a pioneer of Southern Oregon and one of the early Indian fighters. Regarding his death, the Gold Beach Globe says:

Mr. Deadmond was born in Marion county, Illinois, on Jan. 29th, 1831,

having crossed the plains with an ox team in 1854, and served in the Rogue River Indian War as a volunteer. After the hostile Indians were subdued, Mr. Deadmond settled in Curry county, near Port Orford, where he resided continuously ever since. About three years ago his health failed, which weakened his mind as well as his body. In May, 1909, a guardian was appointed, who took care of the old man here in Gold Beach until February of this year, when it became necessary to place him in the State home for feeble minded, where he died. He leaves one sister and one brother in Illinois, one sister in Texas, several nieces and nephews in the Willamette Valley and State of Washington, and one niece in this county, Mrs. L. A. McBride of Port Orford.

H. C. Adams Wedded to Miss Leila W. Perry.

BANDON, Ore., August 15.—Henry C. Adams and Miss Leila W. Perry were married at the residence of the officiating clergyman, Rev. A. Haberly. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. S. 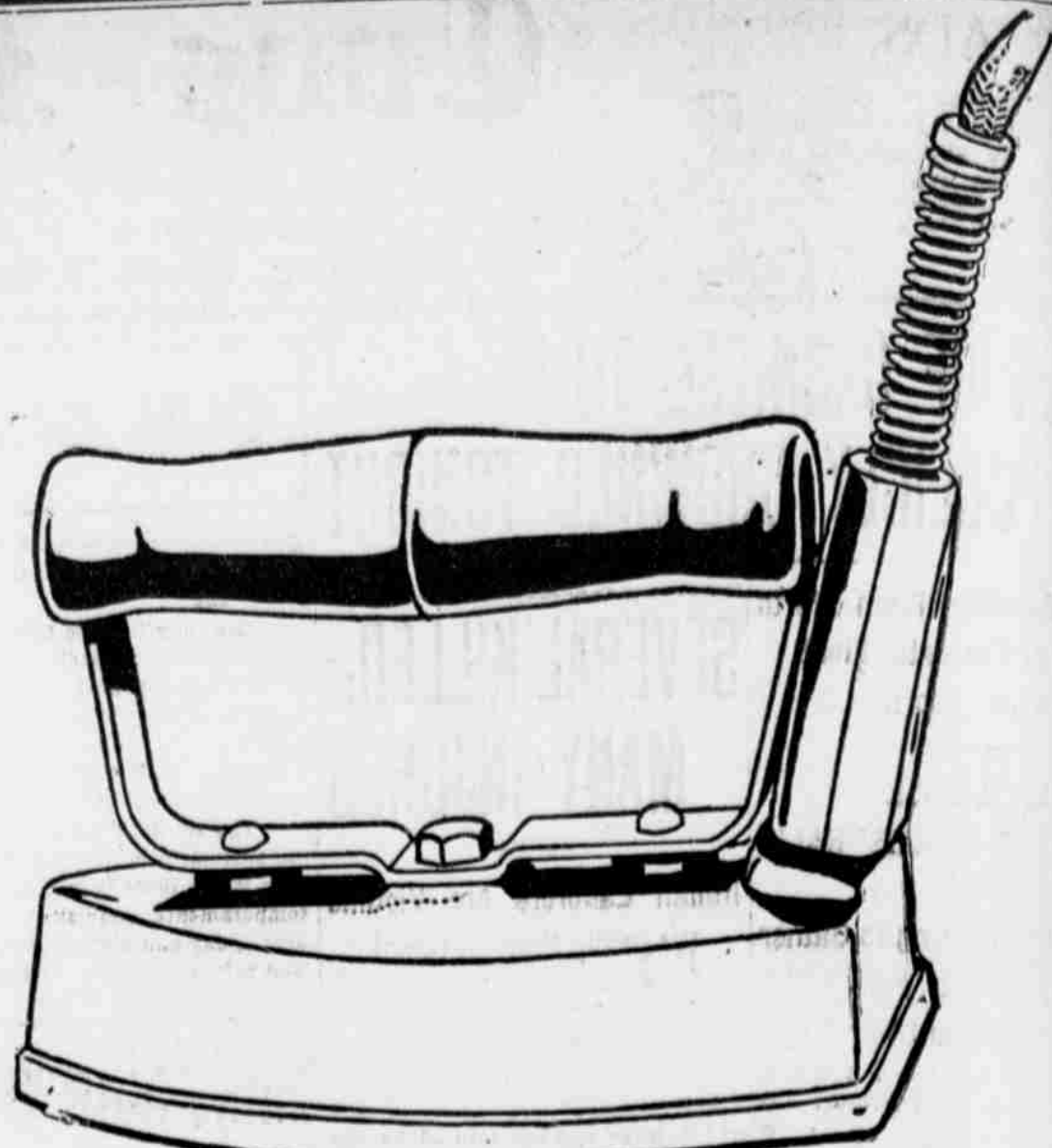

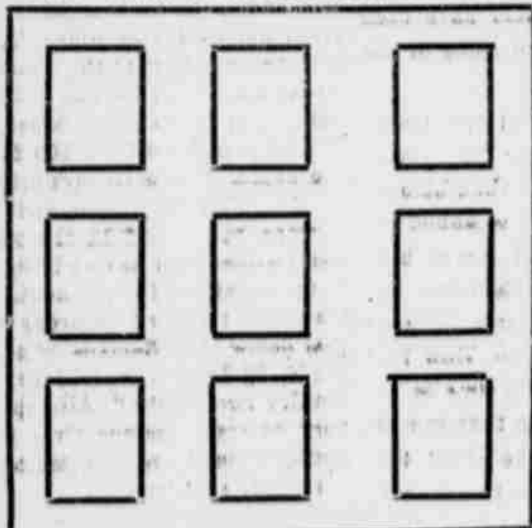
