Flushing Sewer.—The sewer on Front street, about which there was some complaint and on account of which the sidewalk was torn up, is being flushed to-day.

Moves to Coquille.—Paul Stephens, who recently bought the Corthell-Davis Bakery, went to Coquille this afternoon to complete arrangements to move it to that city.

Special Police.—The regular city police force has four extra men on duty during the carnival. The special men are R. C. Cordes, Guy Chambers, Walter Richards and Levi Smith.

Union Meeting.—A union meeting in which all of the churches will join, will be held to-night at the Baptist Church. The meeting is preparatory for the revival which is to start soon in this city.

Plant Sails Friday.—The steamer M. F. Plant, which was to have sailed to-day for San Francisco, will not leave until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock. The sailing day was postponed because the vessel received an order to carry about 60,000 feet of lumber from North Bend.

Circulating Petitions.—Petitions which are to be presented to the county board are being circulated in different parts of the county for signatures. The petitions ask that provisions be made for the county to have all of the timber cruised so that there can be an equitable assessment of the timber lands.

Coming to Marshfield.—A press telegram states that F. A. Bledgen has resigned as superintendent of the public schools of Mason, Mich., to take a position in the public schools of this city. Mr. Bledgen was formerly a teacher at Detroit University and also professor at Vermontville and the Cass City schools.

Busy at Bandon.—George Treadgold arrived here from Bandon last night to spend a few days on the Bay. Mr. Treadgold reports everything flourishing at Bandon, all of the industries being busy with the exception of the shipyard. The litigation over it is nearly finished and Mr. Treadgold and a syndicate of Bandon and California capitalists expect to arrange to open it soon. Mr. Treadgold's wife and daughter are with him.

Will Improve Store.—F. H. Virtue, who recently bought the interests of his partner, Mr. Humphrey in the Owl Furniture Store, is planning some extensive improvements in that establishment.

Coos County Cattle.—Gene Hanan and son, Mar, and Sam Smith arrived Monday from Coos county with a drove of 350 head of cattle which was purchased by Mr. Hanan for the Portland market. The stock is in excellent condition and a finer lot of beef cattle would be hard to get. While away Mr. Hanan also purchased 300 additional head which he will bring out for shipment from this city about the 25th of the present month.—Roseburg News.

Is Advanced.—Mr. Parrott, who has represented Dunn, Garrigan and Hayden in this section for the past year, has been advanced by his employers to a larger and better field and will leave to-morrow for Central California to assume his new duties. His departure from here will be greatly regretted by the many friends he has made, but nevertheless they will be gratified to learn of his advancement. His successor in this territory has not been announced.

Look For Panther.—Chas. Hickox and Edgar Mauzey have been making strenuous efforts to sight a big panther, which has been prowling around the waterworks station west of Marshfield. They haven't been successful yet though. Last Sunday when D. L. Foote and Joseph Josephson were going to Norway, they almost ran onto a big panther in the road near Coaledo. The auto missed him only a few feet and if they had a gun, they could have bagged him. A big panther was killed at the Foote ranch at Norway a few weeks ago.
