Business Men Discuss Coming Revival Before Religious Workers.

A large crowd was in attendance at the Tabernacle Sunday evening to express willingness and loyalty to the coming evangelistic campaign under Milford Hall Lyon of Wheaton, Ill. About thirty professional and business men sat on the platform and with but one exception the addresses were by laymen. M. C. Horton presided, stating the object of the meeting. I. S. Smith was the first speaker, who made an appeal to the united forces of christian people in Marshfield to rally now and begin a great campaign for God. C. J. Millis spoke briefly and pointedly urging his hearers to make use of their talents, saying, "So many people have rooms for rent in their upper story, their life is vacant, producing nothing." Other addresses were made by R. A. Copple and Rev. Taylor of Myrtle Point. I. S. Kaufman spoke on the "Greatness of Christ," calling attention to Christ's influence in literature, art, painting and reform work. A large choir under the direction of C. J. Millis rendered special hymns, accompanied by the orchestra.

It was announced that Mr. Lyon will be here next Sunday morning and will conduct his first service in the Tabernacle if the Breakwater arrives in time.
