FOREST FIRES.

C OOS COUNTY has thus far escaped any serious loss from forest fires. The alert watchfulness of the local fire patrol added to natural conditions have freed this section from the tremendous fire toll in the forests of other parts of the northwest. The heavy ocean fogs that sweep in each night from the Pacific tend to moisten and keep green the foliage and underbrush that is such a fruitful cause of disastrous fires.

The 1910 record of destruction in the forests of the country bids fair to out-strip all previous figures and totals, and to include a vast element of approved public and private properties than has ever been chronicled before. It is deplorable, but apparently unavoidable. The people are justified, however, in the hope that the Government, will, sometime, discover a means, and use it, for the abatement of these tremendous and irreparable losses.

The one thing that makes the hazard omnipresent and almost impossible of successful checking is the enormous distances and vast ranges involved, which, to be protected in detail and fought comprehensively, would require the services of a standing army of men thoroughly and thickly disposed over half a continent of territory, and it is up to us to say whether this great outlay shall be made. We believe an extension of the policing and rigid range work, is a preventive of the huge firings now due almost entirely to human recklessness, would go far to mimize the danger and loss; and a sharpening of the penalties for such gross neglect and carelessness would help immensely. At all events the waste cannot go on forever. The government must devise some expedient whereby to reduce it, if every federal prison in the land be filled with the criminally-careless people responsible; better than the annual sacrifices that are now staggering the country and impoverishing hundreds of its leading industries and sending this staple, in its thousand-fold form of merchandise, to the untouchable limits of cost to the universal consumer.
