MAKE ATTACK ON ASSEMBLY

Judge McGinn Charges Assembly With Being Illegal—Seeks Injunction.

PORTLAND, Ore., August 27.—The Telegram says:

To prevent M. C. George and E. V. Littlefield from signing arguments favoring the assembly ticket as chairman and secretary, respectively, of the Republican State central committee, Judge Henry E. McGinn, George Joseph and W. S. U'Ren are on their way to Salem to apply for a perpetual injunction from Circuit Judge Gallows. These arguments have been sent to appear in the political pamphlet which the Secretary of State is issuing through the State printing office. If successful in preventing the publication of this argument in the manner in which it is signed, the men bringing the suit believe that everything the assembly has done or is trying to do will be declared illegal, as in contravention of the law, at least until after the primaries are held.

The contention of Joseph and McGinn is that there is no provision in the law whereby there can be a faction within the party, and, in fact, the law is interpreted to prevent the formation of rings and machines prior to the primaries. Further, that there is no provision of the law warranting a faction indicating its preference in the primaries held in that party. The assembly organization has filed an argument with the Secretary of State in behalf of its candidates, naming them as the Republican party candidates. Inasmuch as there are many candidates seeking the Republican nominations, the contention is that the Republican State central committee has no right to name the assembly candidates, or any other set of candidates, as the nominees of the Republican party. In other words, that George and Littlefield, in signing themselves as they do to the argument, are exceeding their authority and are setting themselves up as the Republican party in an attempt to deceive the voters of that party.

Any candidate can have friends write an argument for him to be published in the pamphlet. George and Littlefield could have done so as private individuals or friends of the assembly candidates, but in signing themselves as chairman and secretary of the Republican State central committee, the objectors considered that they went too far. The complaint asking for the perpetual injunction says "that certain members of the Republican State central committee conspired and confederated together for the purpose of securing an advantage on the part of said assembly candidates over the candidates who are not assembly candidates by preparing certain arguments and statements in favor of said assembly candidates."

Further, continues the complaint: "That M. C. George and E. V. Littlefield in consummation of said conspiracy, and for the purpose of giving said assembly candidates an apparent indorsement of the Republican party of the State of Oregon, signed said statement and arguments so requested to be published as follows: 'Republican State committee, by M. C. George, chairman; E. V. Littlefield, secretary.'"

"That certain members of said Republican State central committee are by reason of the facts hereinbefore alleged, fraudulently and unlawfully attempting to secure on behalf of said assembly candidates an apparent indorsement thereof by said Republican State central committee, and to thereby mislead and deceive the electors who may read said arguments and statements in said political pamphlet, and who may vote at said primary election, in this: That the said electors will believe that the assembly candidates, being those candidates in favor of whom said arguments and statements are requested to be published are in fact the candidates for their respective offices selected and indorsed by the Republican party through said Republican State central committee, whereas in truth and in fact said assembly candidates, as hereinbefore alleged, are seeking the nominations the same as all other candidates, and were designated by said assembly as desirable candidates, which assembly consisted of delegates irregularly and unlawfully designated and appointed to attend a pretended convention or assembly in the city of Portland, Oregon, assuming the power and authority of naming candidates for the offices created for the government of the State of Oregon, and all municipal government included therein."

In conclusion, the complaint declares the assembly to have been unlawful and not authorized by the law of Oregon.
