RAILWAY OFFICIALS VISIT.

THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC officials have come and gone. They met a number of prominent Coos Bay citizens officially and socially, but they left no definite assurance of an early solution of Coos Bay's railway transportation problem. There has developed in some manner a wholly unwarranted assumption that the people here are hostile to the Southern Pacific. They are not. The people here would gladly welcome the Southern Pacific and extend all possible advantages and courtesies for its coming when convinced of its earnestness. This, also, despite the fact that there are hundreds of people in the Coos Bay section who feel they have not been fairly treated by that company. These people were invited and induced to come to Coos Bay by the positive assurance of the Southern Pacific Company that they would build a line to Coos Bay. The road was started and much money spent and then all work abandoned. Nothing has been done since. The Southern Pacific has a record of bottling up different sections and letting them remain in that condition until they get ready to pull the cork. Coos Bay has waited patiently many years for the use of that corkscrew. That some people have grown a bit impatient is not remarkable. There is no feeling of resentment, however, and the glad hand of good feeling is nowhere more open or extended in heartier fashion than on Coos Bay. The Southern Pacific or any other road that is seeking an entrance into this section so marvellously rich in natural resources will find a cordial welcome here.

The people of Coos Bay were glad to have even this brief visit from these prominent officials. It will give them a more intimate knowledge and a more vivid view of the Coos Bay country. While reticent to the point of silence on the matter of new construction, they were very free in their expressions of surprise and favorable impressions of Marshfield. They remained only overnight, but it was sufficient to get a glimpse of the city and some of its citizens. The Times trusts the trip is as significant as indications would seem to make it and that hopes long deferred for a railway to Coos Bay may be soon realized as a result of this visit of the men who build steel highways.

WHAT MAKES A CITY?

IT IS GENERALLY believed that a city must be possessed of natural advantages and resources and good transportation facilities, in order that it may attain pre-eminence along commercial and manufacturing lines.

It is true that these things are helpful in the life and growth of a city, but they are not indispensable. A case in point is the city of Kewanee, Ill. Here is a city that had no natural conditions considered essential to a city's growth. Situated on a piece of raw prairie on one line of railroad with no large river and with no timber nor mineral sources of wealth, and yet it has become a large manufacturing city, and its reputation for the excellence of its ware and commodities is world wide. A few of its enterprising citizens

commenced the manufacture of steam boilers of a superior grade, and now Kewanee boilers are sent all over the world. Others installed a plant for making brass tubing and the products of the tube works are shipped to all countries, as well as to every part of the United States. Other lines manufacturing have helped to make Kewanee a conspicuous city. The public spirited and brainy business men of Kewanee determined to build a city and they worked together for that purpose with a persistency seldom seen. They knew no such word as fail. Like Napoleon, who said there shall be no Alps, they said, virtually, there shall be no natural disadvantages in Kewanee and we will supplement the opportunities we have with efforts to manufacture and advertise a better quality of goods than are made elsewhere, and so Kewanee has forged ahead and distanced many more favorably situated cities.

Now consider what might be accomplished on Coos Bay with its many and varied resources. Coos Bay has the greatest transportation outlet anywhere in its fine harbor. There are extensive coal mines that will furnish cheap fuel, there are great forests with their tremendous supply of virgin timber, then there are the fertile fields that furnish fruit and food. It has a splendid climate, healthful and enjoyable. It has many churches and the best of public schools in Oregon. With all these and other advantages, Coos Bay should become one of the great seaport cities of the Pacific Coast. On the other hand, if the people neglect to seize the opportunities at their doors, and trust too much to the theory that a large city grows with its own momentum, the census of 1920 may not show that 25,000 or 50,000 population and the material benefits that we now reasonably look for.

NOTICE OF SALE OF IMPROVEMENT BONDS.

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received by the Finance Committee of the Common Council of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, at the office of the City Recorder of said City of Marshfield, in the City Hall of said City, until 4 o'clock P. M. of TUESDAY, the 30th day of August, 1910, for the purchase of street improvement bonds to the amount of \$14,490.47, and of sewer improvement bonds to the amount of \$4,112.86, of the said City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon.

All of said improvement bonds to be in denominations not exceeding \$500 and bearing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum from date thereof, payable semi-annually; said bonds to be dated the day of issuance and to mature in ten years thereafter, with prepayment option thereon at face value and accrued interest to date of any semi-annual coupon interest period at, or after, one year from the date of said bonds, upon giving notice by publication in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in Coos county, Oregon, such notice to be published not less than twice during the month preceding such semi-annual period at which such prepayment thereof will be made. The right is expressly reserved to reject any and all bids and upon all or any of such bids, or proposals, being rejected, if there should remain any bonds unsold, the said bonds may be thereafter sold at private sale by said Common Council of said City of Marshfield, Oregon; but in no event to be sold at less than par and accrued interest. Said bonds are authorized by the laws of the State of Oregon and ordinances of the Common Council of the said City of Marshfield, Oregon.

Assessed valuation of said City of Marshfield, Oregon, is \$1,791,549. Bonded indebtedness is \$54,000. Population—Estimated at 5,000. A certified check for 5 per centum of amount of bid, or proposal must accompany each bid to be forfeited to said City of Marshfield in case bid is accepted and bidder fails to accept and make payment for said bond or bonds, covered thereby, within ten days from date of acceptance of said bid or bids.

Each bid or proposal submitted to designate the denominations of said bond or bonds desired.

Bids or proposals received for any amount of said bonds; small bidders being given preference of purchase.

Proposals, or bids, with certified checks, to be enclosed in sealed plain envelopes without distinguishing marks or writing thereon, except the words "Bids for Improvement Bonds of the City of Marshfield, Oregon."
