# MAJOR KINNEY WRITES LETTER

Dear Madam: Your much esteemed favor of the 24th inst. at hand and contents noted with great interest and satisfaction.

It makes my heart bound with gladness to find there are sympathizing friends though lost in the wilderness of that woe-begone country, the debilitating influences of which has the greatest tendency to rot out all there is good and glorious in human life. But as God's plan of salvation is that all people are to grow brighter and better until the perfect day, we will have to tolerate conditions until the now faint ray of light which gives our society the appearance of a rainbow casts off its bewildering flashes. We partake of the color of our surroundings in proportion to the strength or weakness of our character and principles.

It is extremely painful to feel the ungratefulness of some of the people toward me—I have been so self-sacrificing in my earnest efforts for the development of Coos Bay. Many things have I done which will never be known. I have relieved suffering and even mortification of intelligent poor people by giving to the deceased member of the family, the father, the husband, respectable burials, where otherwise they would have been humiliated. I have kept in my employ in the gloomy days of winter, men, whom I did not need at all, simply because they had a right to live and could not well help themselves.

I am as interested as ever in your noble work. There is no club name that I have yet heard which carries with it the all-inspiring influences as that of the "Mothers' and Teachers' Club." Our willingness to devote part of our time throwing light on the path of the young and rising generation is all that raises us above the aimless wanderings of the brute. "Every cloud has a silver lining." Coos Bay has more than her share of those designing, unscrupulous people who thrive both physically and financially on the downfall of others—they are known in all communities as calamity scavengers. That country being so rich in its resources produces very few victims for them, but by the earnest, untiring efforts of the calamity howlers they succeed in turning the current from a live wire and throwing the once progressive spirit into a state of coma. I have a splendid physical dynamo I will rebound and like lightning from a cloudless sky throw a light on them stronger than daylight so that the good people of Coos Bay see clearly through the

cause and effect of all this unfortunate condition existing in the undeveloped country in which you live.

As to the High School proposition, I have this to say: I am too much interested in the country down there to play the part of narrow, shortsightedness. It is not on the district that I will try to get my revenge; that would be "cutting off my nose to spite my face." The school trustees' work is only a transient scene of action. Soon others will occupy the houses, own the property, fill the offices, possess the power and direct the influences which are now in their hands and under their control.

The editor of the Harbor seems to be backed up by the board of trustees in trying to make my conduct toward the high school proposition infamous. He says the school district paid \$1,877.45. The Isaacs and Savage lots, for which they paid \$445.45, I reimbursed through Professor Raab, who has had a credit on his real estate ever since the date of its payment. The \$650.00 paid to the Bennett Trust Company by the private parties who put up the money is secured by their interest in that mortgage. The Trust Company holds the same in trust for them. The high school has the \$650.00 paid to Shahan coming back from the Shahan mortgage as I have had no credit for it. As to the \$75.00 for looking up the title, the \$48.00 for the abstract and the \$9.00 for recording papers is only what any business man would have to do to get a desirable piece of property, even if he were to pay a fair price for it. The \$300.00 which the high school trustees paid me for the spring of water, land around it, and right of way from it, is worth \$1,000.00. I would be glad to reimburse them and take the deed back.

I may not be a good man in the eyes of the "calamity howlers and scavengers" of our country, but will make you this proposition: A vote of the people in Coos county will show that I have more friends in that county than any other one man, and that which is better than gold, the friendship of the best element in that community in which you live.

I may be able to be at your meeting in October. Hoping you ladies of the club will bravely go on in your work and that you may have health to enjoy the beautiful city and splendid people so soon to be experienced there, I am, yours respectfully,

# NOW TIME TO CAN FRUIT

### Crab Apples, Pears and Plums Are Offered in Quantities in Local Market.

This is the time to buy crab apples, plums and pears for preserving and canning. They are in the market now in abundance and the prices are as low as they will be this year. The crab apples are fine, large ones and the plums and pears are of good quality. Either of these three fruits can be bought for \$1.25 a box. That means a large box such as apples are packed in. The prices are as low as can be expected at any time in the season for first-class fruit.

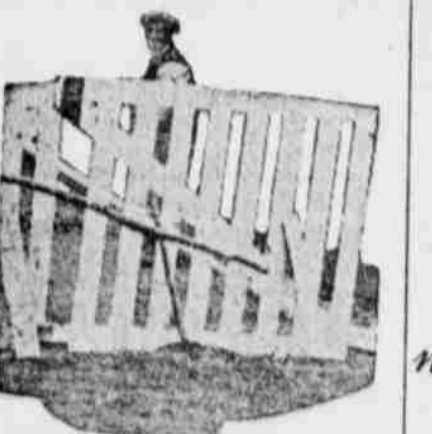
Other Coos county fruits are in the market. Gravenstein apples are plentiful and good. The prices vary. Some are offered as low as 75 cents a box. The average apple sells for about \$1.25 a box, while the extra fancy fruit brings as high as \$1.75 a box. Grapes are from California and sell for 10 cents a pound or 40 cents a basket. Watermelons are a little scarce. They sell for 35 cents each. Cantaloupes are offered at 10 cents each, and like watermelons, are a little scarce until there is another shipment.

Home grown vegetables of many varieties will be offered Saturday. There are radishes, fine large carrots, onions, parsley and beet, all 45 cents a bunch. Nice summer squash sells for 3 cents a pound and cucumbers sell for about 25 cents a dozen, according to the size. String and wax beans are 6 cents a pound. Peas are a little scarce yet, and sell at three pounds for 25 cents. Cabbages are 4 cents a pound and sweet corn 20 cents a dozen.

Potatoes are now mature and of excellent quality. They are selling retail at 1 1/2 cents a pound. Sweet potatoes are also on sale.

Spring chickens sell for 30 cents a pound dressed and stewing fowls at 25 cents a pound dressed ready for cooking.
